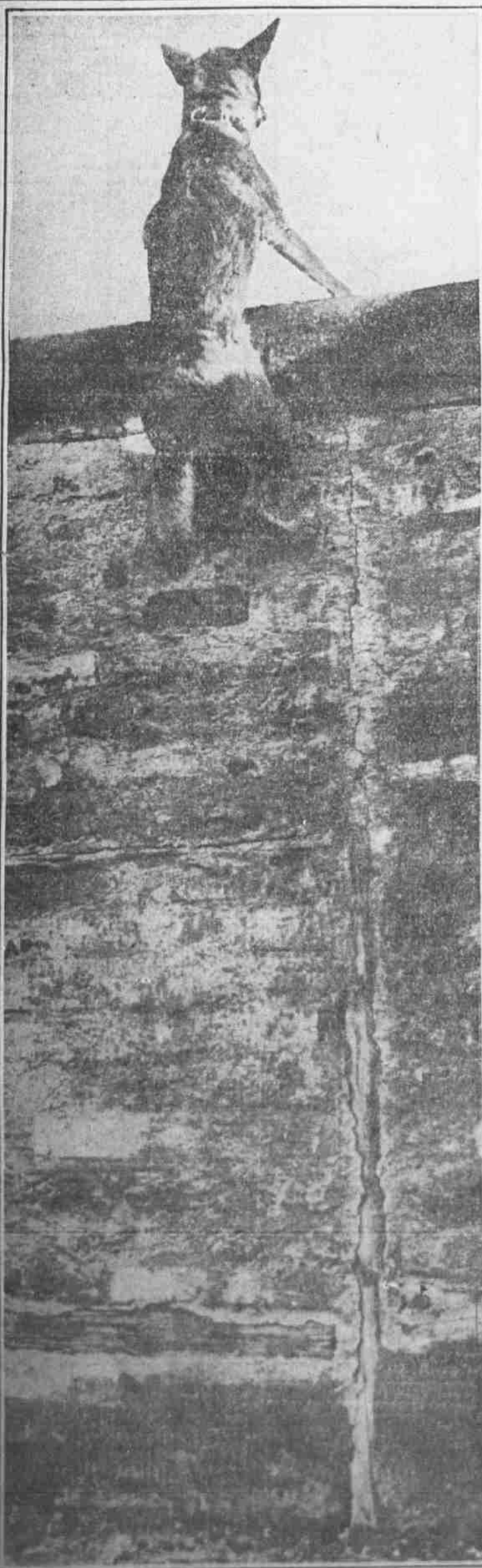


ASSIGNING VACANT LOTS FOR GARDENS

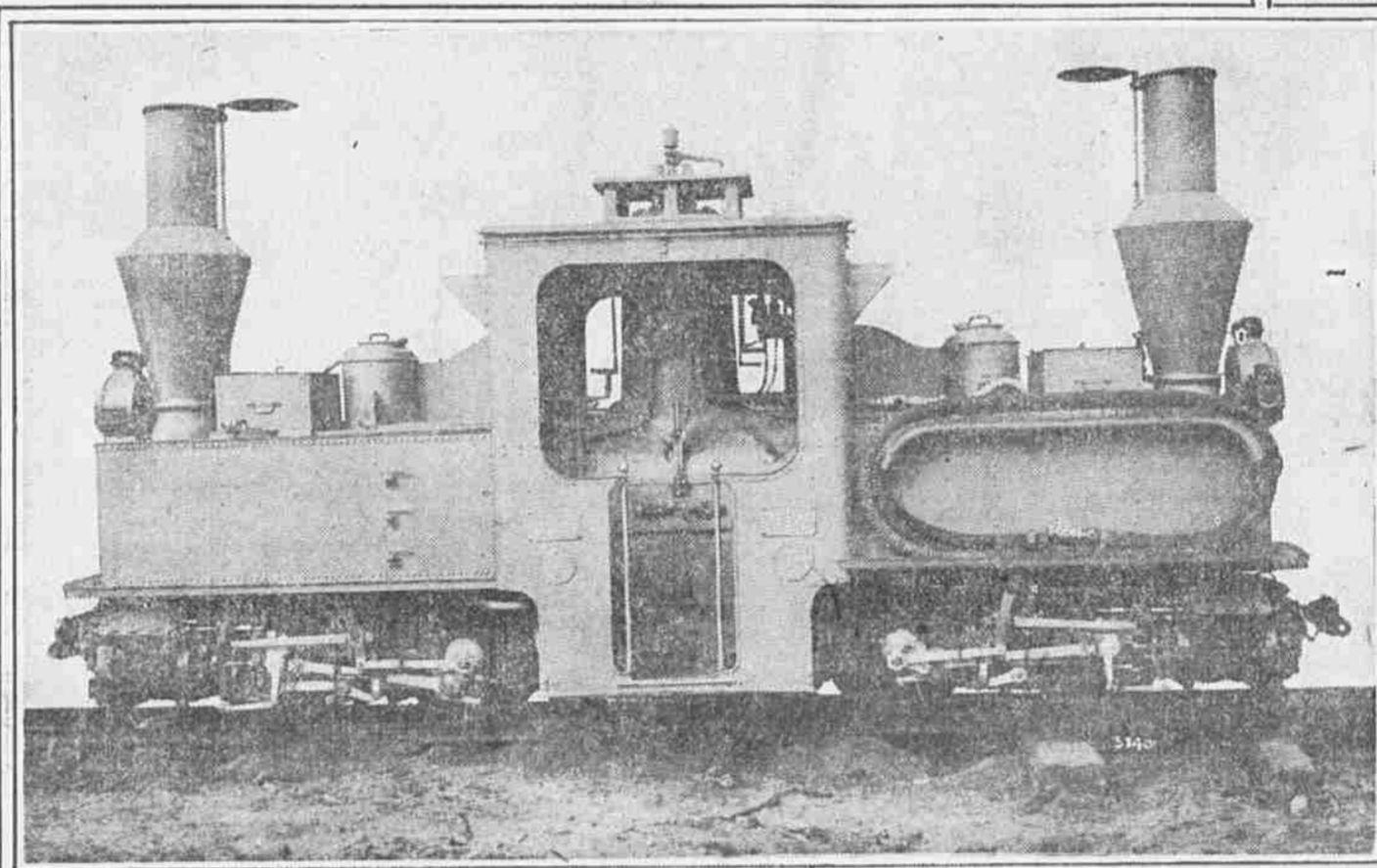


GUARDIAN OF GERMAN WAR CHEST
