

ROSE TREE RACES

Preparations for Annual Affair and Number of Parking Spaces Predict Successful Affair.

Parking spaces for the Rose Tree Fox Hunting Club's spring race meet, one of the best known social events of the spring season, have been coming in rapidly, and to judge from all appearances society will turn out in full force next Saturday afternoon. The races will start at 2:15 o'clock, and the program includes six events, several of which are almost as old as the club and as well known. Notably among them is the first event, the race for farmers' workhorses and ridden only by bona fide farmers of Delaware. Chester and Montgomery Countles. The other one is the famous crosscountry race, which has been run over the club's picturesque course since 1869.

This race is one of the most popular events in the fox hunting circles, and a win is very highly prized. The pick of local hunters and steeplechasers always turns out for this event and there are usually guite a few out-of-town entries to contest with the local talent for the prize. The race is run over a post and rail course extending out and beyond the club's grounds over the hills and dales of the surrounding country and in constant view of the spectators. It is a splendid race from the onlookers' point of view, as the club is situated upon a hill and the riders are seen often like tiny red-coated manniking in the distance, appearing and disappearing behind the natural swells of the land. The jumps on this course are made to counterpart as nearly as possible the natural barriers which would be encountered in an actual hunt.

Antelo Devereux looks particularly well in a trotteur of this type. The material is a Scotch plaid, a black-and-white checked ground being crossed by a red strips. The skirt is circular, and has a seam over each hip, and is topped by a pea jacket devoid of trimming and slashed at each side. The note of simplicity is carried out by the wide roll collar of white linen, and the large black sailor hat trimmed at the right side with two flat quills.

Mrs. Edwin N. Benson, Jr., wears a modish walking suit of navy blue serge. The skirt is given fulness by the inset of several pleats at each side, and the jacket, with its circular flare, is given a military aspect by the use of gold braid, which forms the collar, and round metal buttons, two of which finish off the belt at the back. The young matron's hat is of black hemp, with a transparent brim, and has two spear-shaped ornaments as its sole trimming.

One of Philadelphia's most attractive mairens, hirs, Andrew Wheeles, wears an extremely smart trotteur of dark blue serge. The skirt is made with an overskirt draped in apron effect at the front, and sloping away to the belt, where it is finished off by two braided tabs.
