
### N. J. STARTS TO CORRECT SUFFRAGE ELECTION LAW

Bills Offered to Repeal Defective Act and Make Another.

TRENTON, May 3.-In acordance with Governor Fielder's call for a special session of the Legislature to correct a defect in the act providing for a special election on woman suffrage and other institutional amendments. October oth Houses met shortly after noon to-

day. Two bills to correct the error were introduced. The first repeals the law enacted at the regular session, regarded as useless because of inconsistency reas useless because of inconsistency re-garding ballots. The principal bill pro-vides a special election shall be held Tuesday, October 19, subject to all laws regulating elections.
