N. J. STARTS TO CORRECT SUFFRAGE ELECTION LAW

Bills Offered to Repeal Defective Act and Make Another.

TRENTON, May 2.—In accordance with Governor Fielder's call for a special session of the Legislature to correct a defect in the act providing for a special election on woman suffrage and other constitutional amendments, October 19, both Houses met shortly after noon today.

Two bills to correct the error were introduced. The first repeals the law enacted at the regular session, regarded as useless because of inconsistency regarding ballots. The principal bill provides a special election shall be held Tuesday, October 19, subject to all laws regulating elections. It is especially provided that all laws respecting illegal voting and corrupt election practices shall apply to this election. The bill specifies the form of ballot to be used.

First on ballot will be the woman suffrage question, this being "Shall this amendment, extending the right of vote to woman citizens be adopted?" Opposite this question are the words "yes" and "no," with spaces for the marking of X indicating a vote for or against amendment.
