Marital law is reported to have been declared in all the Italian provinces of Austria and Italian residents are said to be crossing the frontier in large numbers.

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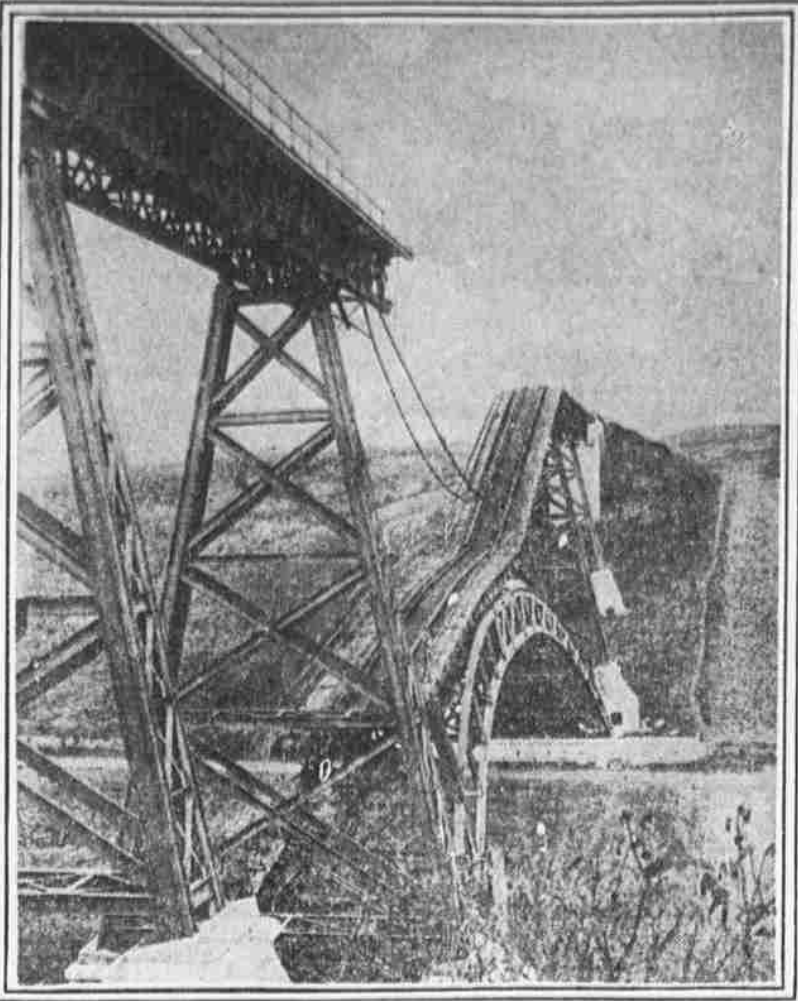

TWO BRITISH LINERS SUBMARINE VICTIMS

Candidate and Centurion Sunk Off Irish Coast by German Raiders—Crews Saved.

LONDON, May 7. Two more British liners have been claimed as victims by German submarines.

The Candidate, 2855 tons, and the Centurion, 2945 tons. Both were torpedoed near County Donegal, southeast of Waterford, on Thursday.

The crews of both vessels were saved. The ships were owned by the Harrison Line. Forty of the crew of the Candidate were landed at Milford Haven, a Welsh port on the coast of St. George's Channel.

The Candidate was about 15 miles off Waterford Harbor when a German submarine suddenly appeared on the surface and fired a torpedo which struck the Candidate's hull below the waterline.

As she began to settle the crew took to the boats and rowed away. The Candidate was outward bound at the time and carried a heavy cargo. She was caught in the steaming lane used by the big transatlantic liners that ply between the United States and England.

The Centurion hailed from Liverpool. She was built in Glasgow in 1908 and was 299 feet long and 51 feet in the beam. According to the latest edition of Lloyd's Register she was commanded by G. N. Kearney.

The trawler Don was blown up in the North Sea Thursday probably by a mine. Several members of her crew were killed. She survived and landed at Grimby today.

EMMA TRENTINI NAMED AS CORESPONDENT

Singer Also Defendant in \$100,000 Suit for Alienating Affections of Composer Friml.

Based on an incident which happened in this city, Emma Trentini, the singer, is named as correspondent in a suit for divorce brought against Rudolph Friml, pianist and composer, by his wife, who has also brought suit against Miss Trentini for \$100,000 for alleged alienation of her husband's affections.

Mrs. Friml declares that Friml and Miss Trentini visited the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in this city during the Christmas holidays, and she names hotels in various other cities as meeting places of her husband and the singer.

At the Ritz-Carlton it was said today that a "Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Friml" had registered at the hotel on December 23 of last year and remained there until January 11.

The plaintiff's attorneys have in their possession a letter signed "Rudolph," purporting to have been written by the composer to Miss Trentini while she was in Detroit last November. It reads: "The Cottonwood, 609 W. 16th st., 'Dearest darling Emma, 'Enclosed you'll find a copy of a telegram which was sent to my wife in New York yesterday in the New York Supreme Court, specify numerous occasions on which Friml and the singer are said to have met at hotels, particularly in the months of January, February, March and as recently as last month."

The Frimls were married in 1909 and have two children, Charles Rudolph, 5, and Lucille, 3 years old. Until last November they lived together in New York. Then Mrs. Friml went to Los Angeles, where she had formerly lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ludwig Harusch. A dispatch from Los Angeles says that Mrs. Harusch declared her daughter "had a clear cut case."

CHINA ACCEPTS JAPAN'S DEMANDS

PEKIN, May 7. China has yielded virtually all of the Japanese demands and only details now remain to be worked out. It is believed that this will surely prevent war between China and Japan.

The Chinese Government sent a new reply to Japan, the text of which is as yet unknown, but officials say that in effect it is an acceptance, under protest, of the chief Japanese demands.

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GERMANS REPULSE BRITISH ASSAULTS ON HILL NO. 60
