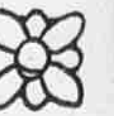
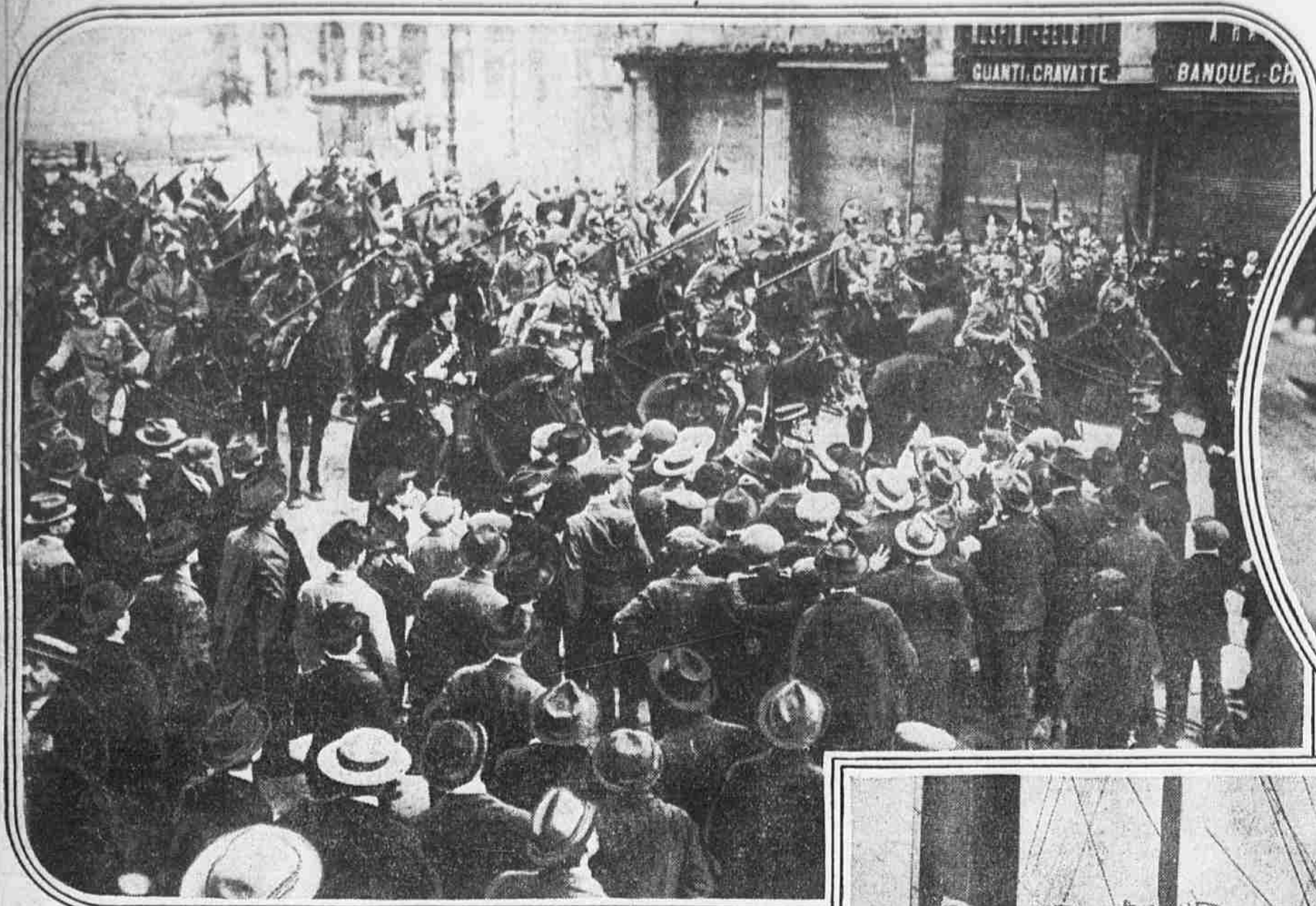

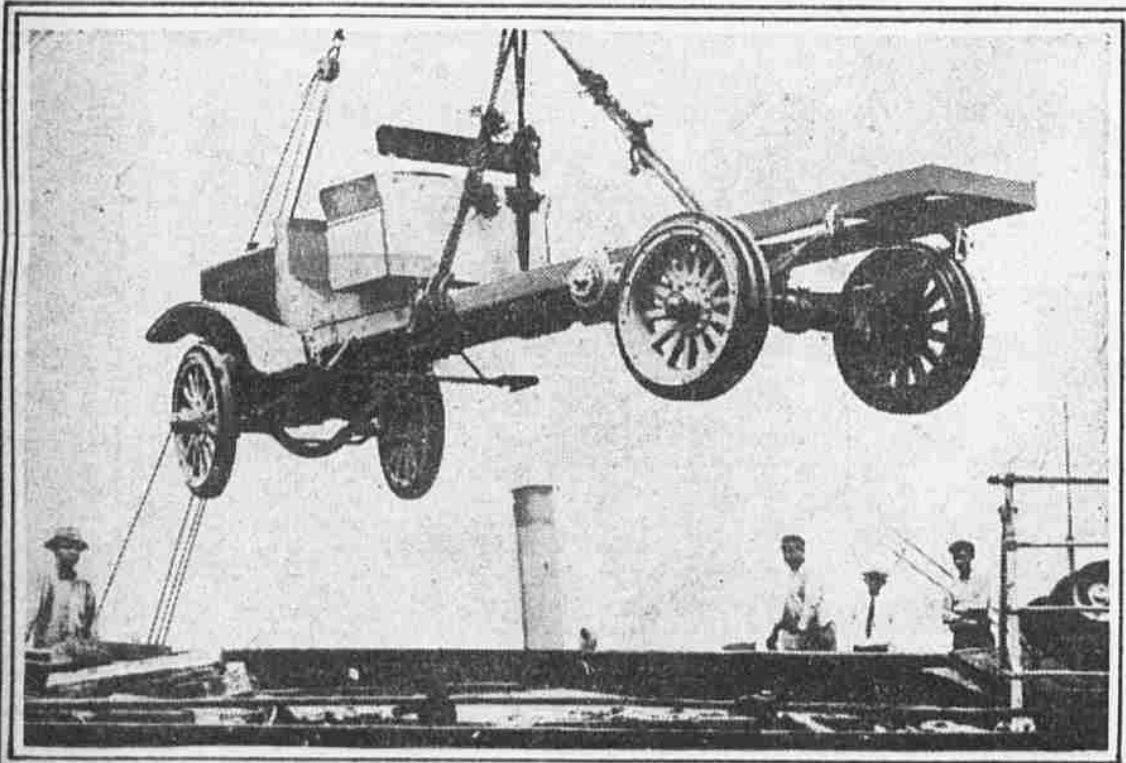

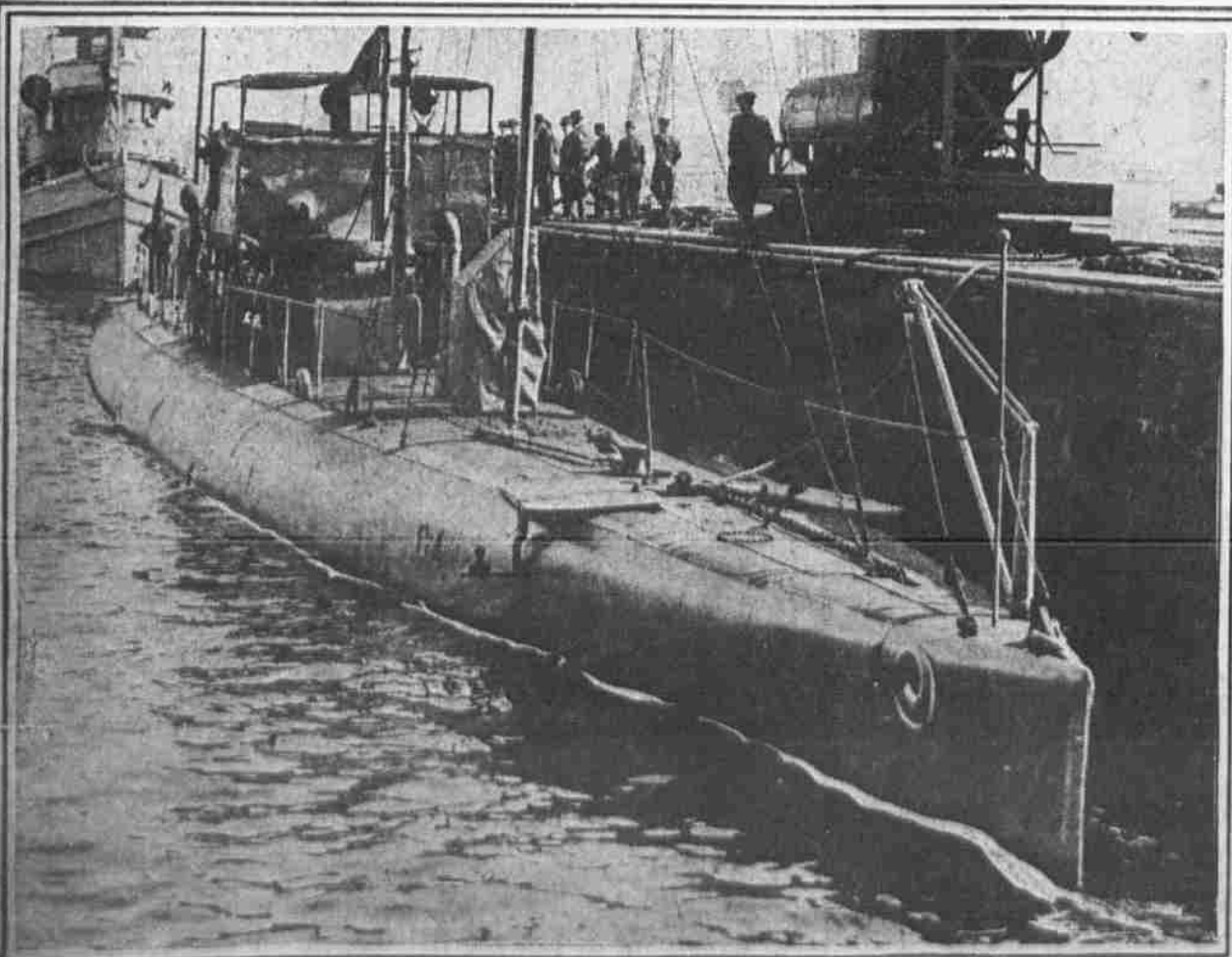

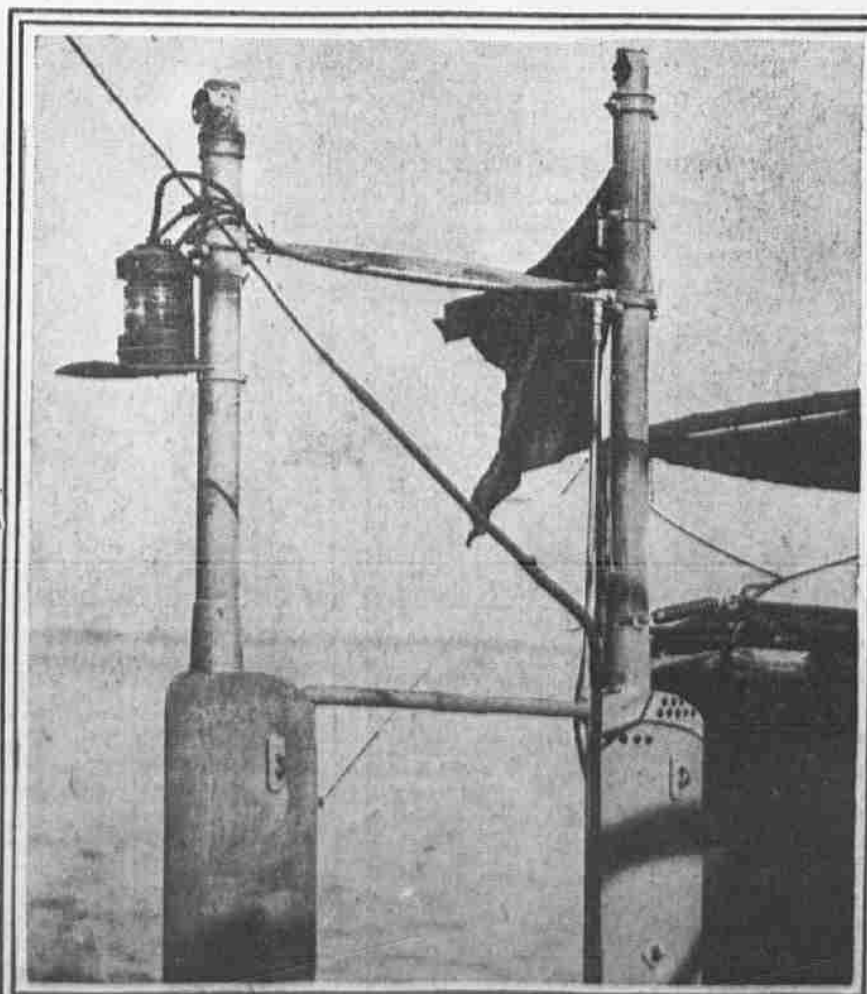


HIS A GREAT NAME AND A DESPERATE MISSION

A NEAR VIEW OF THE G-4'S PERISCOPES

The lenses at the very top are the eyes of the submarine. By a system of mirrors everything the lenses catch is reflected to the interior of the submarine. These little detectors are the only parts of the submarine which are exposed when the craft takes observations.
