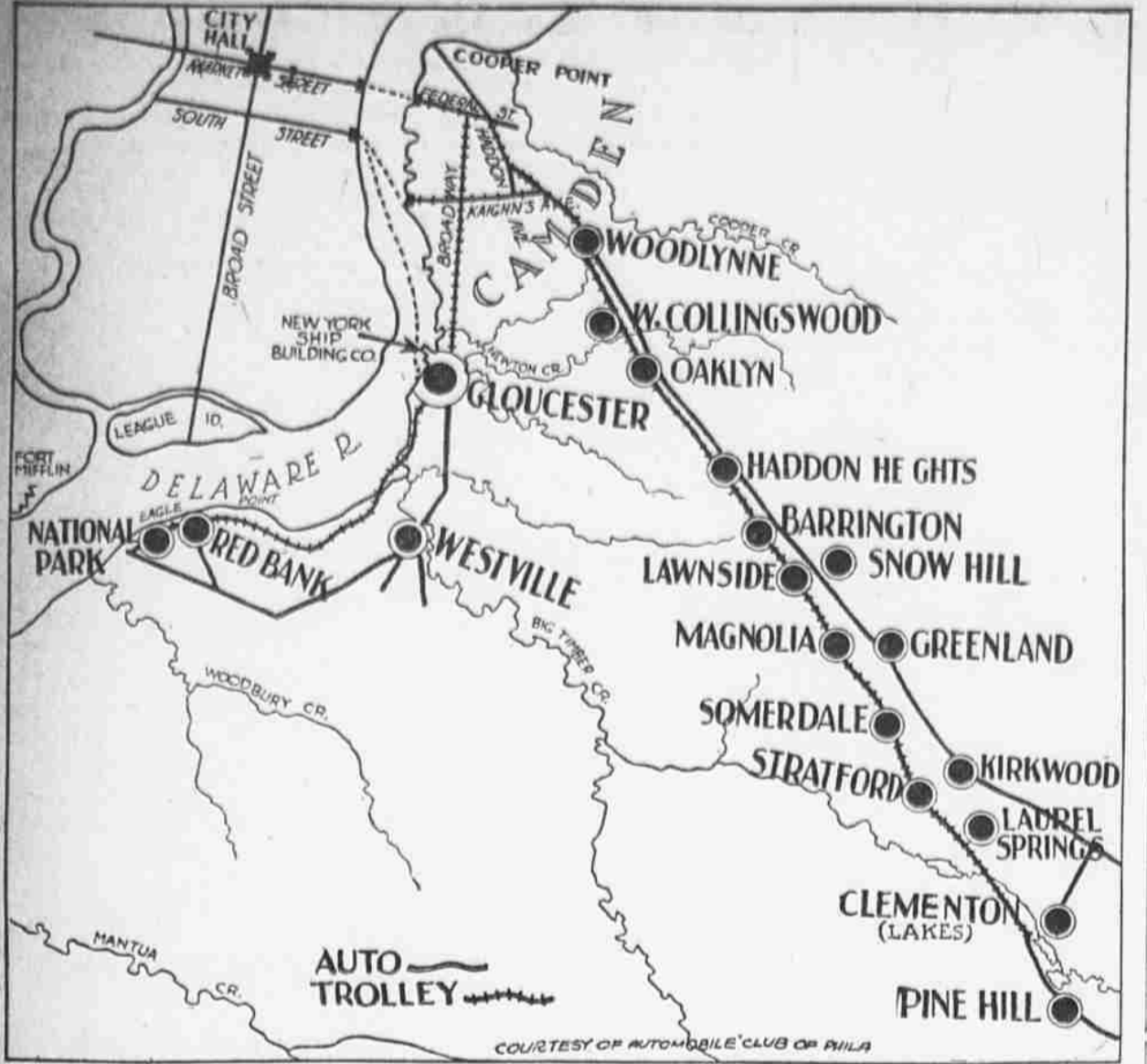


THIRD EVENING LEDGER "VACATIONETTE" GIVES TWO DELIGHTFUL PICNIC TRIPS IN NEW JERSEY



Thousands of men, women and children in Philadelphia are denied an opportunity to get away from the heat and dirt of the city during the summer. Few cities in the East are more advantageously situated for short, refreshing, economical trips to the country than is Philadelphia...

Representatives of the EVENING LEDGER take these trips personally in advance, with an eye to determine the exact cost for fares and meals, and the points of recreation, scenic value and historic interest...

A little trip into New Jersey varied the scenery on our third vacationette. We took two journeys in order that we might be able to place before EVENING LEDGER readers the choice of a jaunt into the suburbs of Camden or a ride along the Delaware River to National Park.

The first trip was to Clementon, through West Collingswood, Audubon, Haddon Heights, Laurel Springs and other suburban communities. At the end of the ride, which is but an hour from the ferry, we found an attractive amusement park with boating and bathing the principal features.

Riding along Richey avenue, we saw inviting detached single family houses. It was a great relief after the rows of conventional, undistinctive looking houses which are an common feature in Philadelphia.

After Oaklyn we passed through Audubon and Oraton to Haddon Heights. This thriving suburb marks the end of the 5-cent fare limit.

A DELIGHTFUL PICNIC SPOT. Large fields, rolling country and, in the background, woods characterized the scenery which we passed after leaving Haddon Heights, Barrington, Lawnside, Magnolia and Somerdale, all suburban communities, followed in rapid succession.

TO NATIONAL PARK. There are three ways to start for National Park. One may leave from Federal street, or Knight's Point, Camden, or from Gloucester. The Gloucester car from either of the Camden ferries goes to Washington Park where it is necessary to change for National Park.

For the best and cheapest way to board the trolley at South street, the car is boarded at the South street trolley stop.

STARS FROM ALL STATES IN 4TH OF JULY FLAG

Forty-eight Governors Promise to Send Contribution to National Emblem.

A star from every State in the Union will be sent here to form part of an American flag which will be unfurled at Independence Hall during the ceremonies of the national Fourth of July celebration. Governors of half of the States have already assured Charles W. Alexander, secretary of the Citizens' Committee, that they will send stars as requested...

The Citizens' Committee, of which ex-Judge Dimmer Beeber is chairman, will meet early next week to discuss plans for the historical features of the ceremonies. The committee is composed of the following prominent Philadelphians, who also directed the centennial celebration here in 1876:

S. D. HOUSE WILL LEAVE CHARITABLE BEQUESTS Ethical Culture Society Is One of Beneficiaries.

Skille D. Heuss, formerly of Philadelphia who died at West Chester, Pa., made the following public bequests from her \$30,000 estate in her will, admitted to probate today:

Sum of \$199 each to the Chester County Children's Aid Society and to the West Chester Trust and Relief Society; sums of \$500 each to the High Street Friends' Meeting for the Young Friends' Association, and to the Ethical Culture Society of Philadelphia.

Other wills probated today include those of William S. Driver, who died in San Diego, Cal., leaving \$41,000; J. Anna Price Powell, \$12,000; Jane W. Trout, \$100. Personal property of Sarah T. Leonard has been appraised at \$15,359.90; Elmira B. Bishop, \$75,157; and Joseph Leonard, \$150.

ORDER OF EAGLES IN CAMDEN REFUSED A LIQUOR LICENSE

Sunday Selling and Cabaret Cause Judge Boyle to Refuse Renewal. Camden will be considerably more arid on Sundays in the future as the result of a decision of Judge Boyle today in the Camden County Court refusing to renew the liquor license held by the Fraternal Order of Eagles, Camden, No. 65.

The Camden Eagles own a \$100,000 building at 415 Broadway. Sunday selling of liquor, admitted by officials of the Eagles who were called to testify today, and by members who had written to Judge Boyle, was responsible for the order. The Eagles also ran a cabaret on Sunday, according to letters to Judge Boyle. The court's order becomes effective at once.

LEADERS AROUSED OVER TRANSIT BILL

Rumors Current That Dunn Bill Will Be Killed in Committee. Transit leaders here have been thoroughly aroused by the news from Harrisburg that the Dunn bill, providing for the through routing of cars from the present lines to the proposed lines and for a joint fare rate to be arranged with the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company is likely to be killed in committee.

Pressure is being brought upon the legislative leaders today to have the bill reported out at once, and a prompt investigation will be made to place the responsibility for the "pickling."

Edward B. Martin, chairman of the Transportation Committee of the United Business Men's Association, when informed of the situation, said: "The holding up of this bill is a blow aimed at the proper development of the rapid transit plans for Philadelphia. The bill would give Director Taylor the authority which he needs to go ahead with the question of through-routing surface and elevated lines at a joint rate to be decided by the Public Service Commission. I speak for the Transportation Committee of the United Business Men when I say that we think this bill should pass."

The opponents of the Taylor plan, led by Senator McNichol, who have failed in most instances in their efforts to modify the Director's program, appear in this to be successful and so pleased are the members of the committee, who know anything about it, that they are said to be frankly rejoicing.

"POP" CONCERTS TO BE GIVEN NEXT YEAR

Philadelphia Orchestra Will Play Every Night in May, at Close of 1916 Season.

The "Pop" concerts have come to stay. It was declared today by persons close to the management of the Philadelphia Orchestra that it had been virtually decided to give the concerts next year and every weekday evening during the month of May, instead of for two weeks.

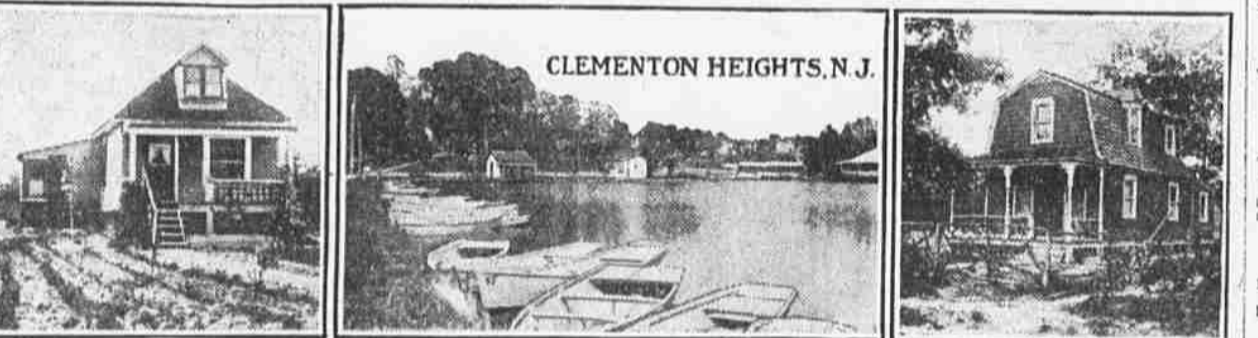
