"Our appeal to the people of Philadelphia is in behalf of the afflicted, suffering poor, for they will benefit by the establishment of the new hospital." he stated recently. "All who contribute have the comfort of knowing that what they give will go directly to the alleviation of human suffering. If they give liberally of their means, and even if they make sacrifices in the cause of Christian charity, what is the most generous offer-ing in comparison with what the Sisters of Mercy, at my request, have consented They offer their lives and promise to bear the burden of conducting and maintaining this institution of mercy without hope of human reward and solely for the love of God and their neighbor. Surely the public will not fail to give them all the sympathy and material as-sistance necessary to accomplish their great work."
