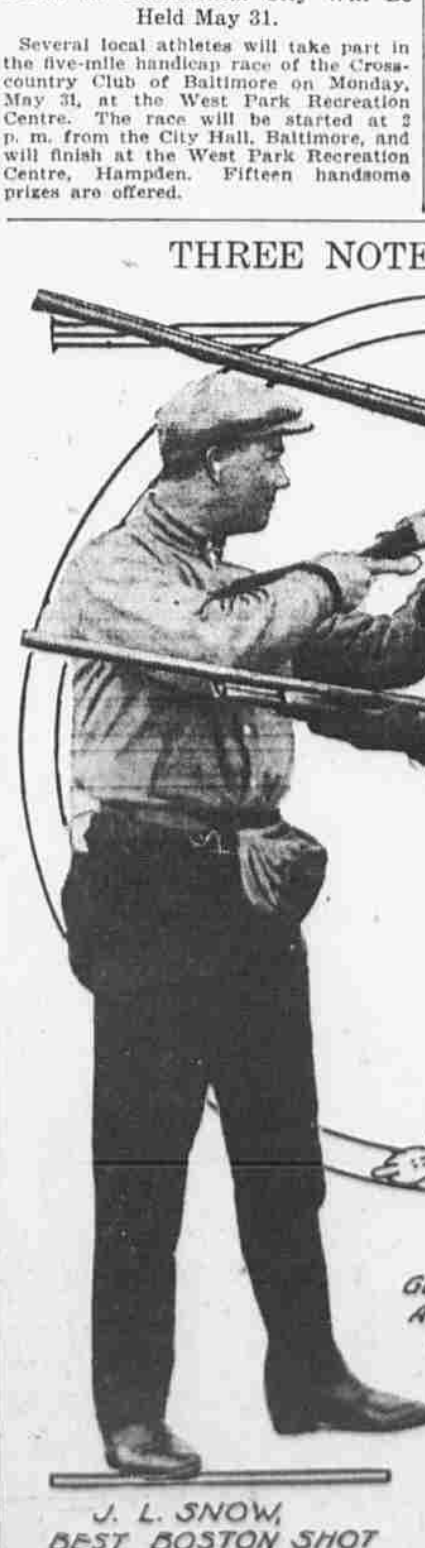
WILLIAMS AND WASHBURN FOR COAST TENNIS PLAY
