Girls studying horticulture is an idea carried out in America only in the last three or four years. After the start was made the school's growth is a direct tribute to Miss Jessie f. Morgan, the managing director. She is terself an illustration of the benefit of this new training for women. She studied law at the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1901 with an LL. M. degree at the cost of her health. After a bad physical breakdown Miss Morgan turned to a career out of doors, and fortunately chose the Ambler School as having the ideal course of instruction. She built up her impaired health rapidly and evidenced such executive ability while acting as assistant to a former principal that the managers two years ago selected her to take charge of the school. In the short time she has held this position she has more than doubled the number of students, added to the school's curriculum and increased the equipment. Under Miss Morgan's direction the pres-

ent two-year course is absolutely thor-ough. It includes general methods and principles of bortleulture, floriculture, greenhouse management and construc-tion, fruit growing, vegetable gardening, otany, chemistry, garden zochogy, entomolegy, study of soils, simple carpentry market conditions, methods and book-keeping, commercial law, landscape gardening, bee keeping, poultry raising, school gardening and preserving.


