

ATHLETICS BATTLING FOR CELLAR POSITION—WOMEN'S GOLF TOURNEY AT ST. MARTIN'S

MISS HOLLINS LEADS IN GOLF TOURNAMENT SLEEPY HOLLOW CLUB

West Brook Expert Turns in a Card of 91—Miss Faith, of Wykagyl, Had 101—Regular Tees Have Been Moved for Women.

SLEEPY HOLLOW COUNTRY CLUB, Harborside, N. Y., May 24.—With a fair chance to finish in close to record figures, Miss Marion Hollins, of West Brook, former title holder, handed in a card and led in the early part of the opening round for the women's metropolitan golf championship today over the links of the Sleepy Hollow Country Club.

Playing with Miss Hollins was Mrs. William J. Faith, of Wykagyl, who had a 91. Miss Hollins went out in flying colors, recording a 41, and it looked as if she would hang up some remarkable figures. She continued the pace until the long 17th and took three putts for a 7. Then she took three more on the 17th, where she might have had a par 4.

It was the 480-yard last hole, however, which broke her heart. A fine long drive landed encouragingly. She flubbed her second and played short of the bunker to avoid the trouble on her third. Then she flubbed the next and got into the deep trouble she wanted to avoid and took two whacks to get out of the next hole. The green's edge, but her approach was so well up she needed only one putt. When she turned in her score some of the others consoled with her.

"I'm mad, me so angry to get into that hole, I guess I lost my head," she wistfully replied.

Having a little consideration for the feelings of the women, the committee has moved a few of the tees forward a trifle, thereby cutting the total yardage from 540 to 480. There have been several changes at the first, second, third, fifth, seventh, eighth, fourteenth, fifteenth and sixteenth holes.

The course looked in excellent condition when the players gathered here this morning and everybody prayed for clear weather. It rained off and on, though not hard.

Miss Lillian B. Hyde, of South Shore, Middlebrook, got away fairly early in company with Mrs. Philip Bayer, of Tinton Rock. Another pair to attract attention consisted of Miss Marion Hollins, of West Brook, a former association champion, and Mrs. W. J. Faith, of the Wykagyl woman, who always makes a good showing in tournaments.

Because of the large number of women and the caddy supply was severely taxed. It was figured, however, that allowing the lady who went off with the caddy to start right out again, there would be supplied.

Threatening skies greeted the women when they teed up, and when about half the field was away it began to rain. Naturally this slowed up the course considerably and made the going anything but comfortable. Some of the players were a sorry sight as they came in off the course.

That Sleepy Hollow is not an easy course is attested by the fact that 74 is the professional record and was made last year by Alec Smith, of Wykagyl, and Miss Hyde last week made 85, the best for women players. B. Sterling Bottomo is credited with the amateur mark 76.

There was some changing around in the pairings, owing to the fact that some of the players appeared late.
