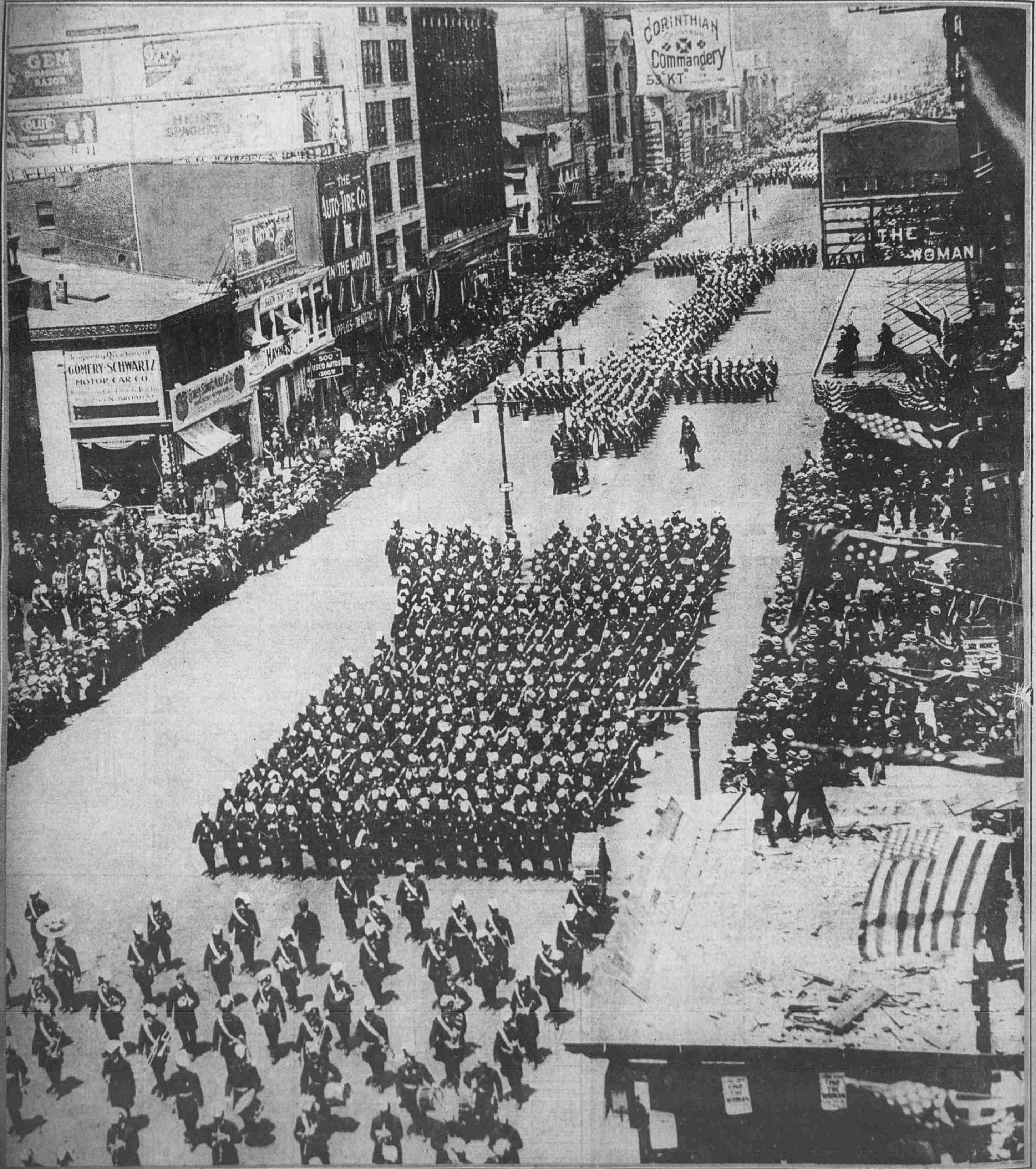

MOST SPECTACULAR FEATURE OF TODAY'S GREAT KNIGHT TEMPLAR PARADE AS VIEWED FROM HOUSETOPS



THOUSANDS LINING CITY'S SIDEWALKS STAND SILENT AS LIVING MEN FORM CROSSES FAMOUS IN KNIGHT TEMPLAR HISTORY

The most impressive feature of today's spectacular parade of the Knights Templar of the State of Pennsylvania, now holding their conclave in this city, was the formation of the four great crosses which figure in Templar ceremonies out of the ranks of marching men. These formations were made at Broad and Race streets and were held until the divisions reached City Hall where State and city officials reviewed the parade from grandstands. The "Passion Cross" was made up of men in the 1st Division, which was commanded by V. E. Sir Bradley W. Lewis, deputy grand commander. The "Double Cross" was enacted by the 2d Division, which was commanded by Eminent Sir Andrew G. Williams, grand generalissimo; the "Salom Cross" was made up of the 3d Division, commanded by Eminent Sir Charles M. Clement, grand senior warden, while the "Greek Cross" comprised the 4th Division, commanded by Eminent Sir Frederic B. Black, grand junior warden.
