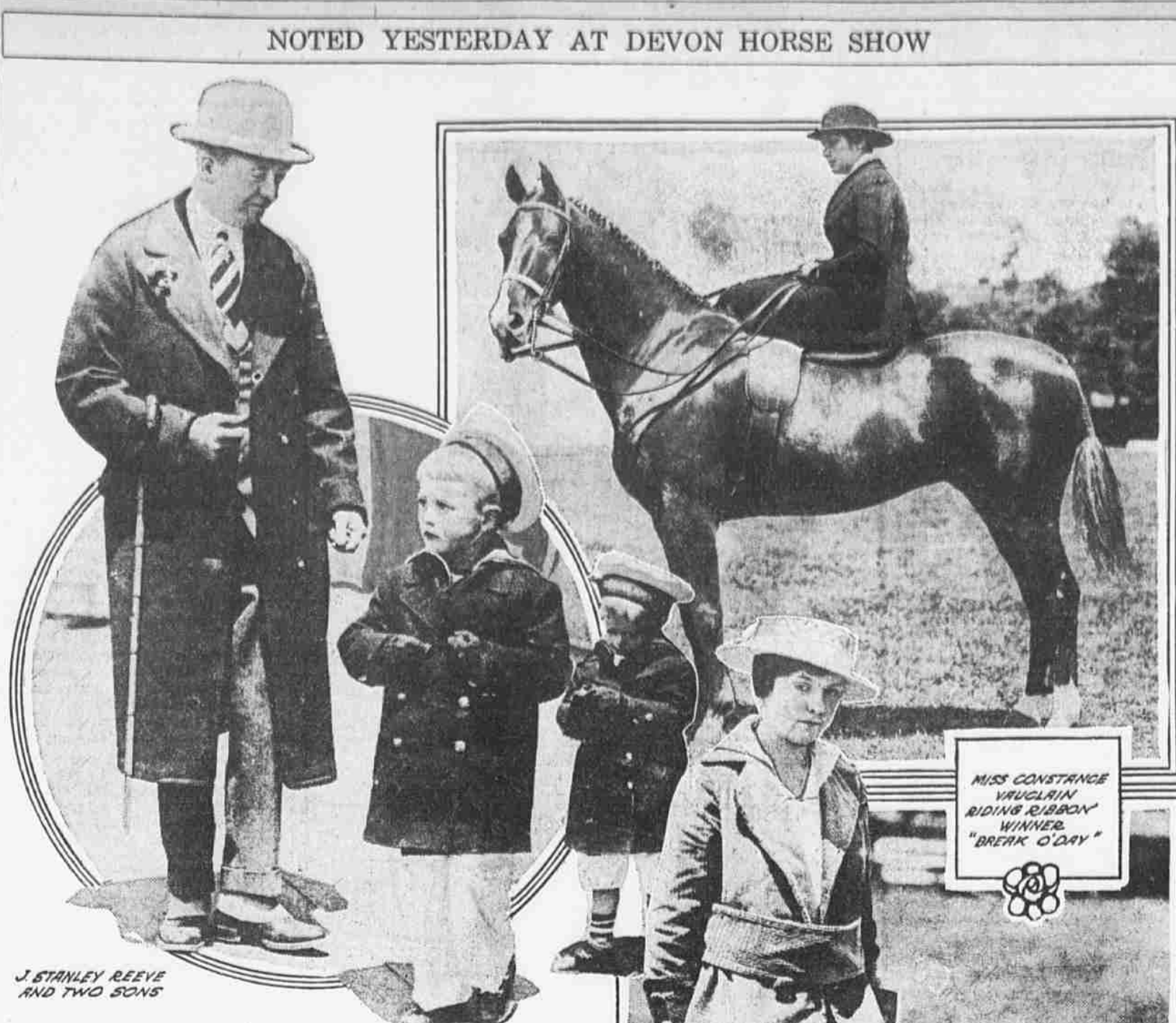


NOTED YESTERDAY AT DEVON HORSE SHOW
