BRITISH NAVAL STATIONS GOAL **OF ZEPPELINS**

GERMAN AIR RAIDS ON GREAT BRITAIN

WAY TO PEACE IS HINTED AT IN **GERMAN REPLY**

To Contain First Definite Suggestion for End of Hostilities, Washington Hears.

Rupture of Diplomatic Relations With U. S. Decried as Impossible by Kaiser's Diplomats-America to Be Mediator.

By LOWELL MELLETT

WASHINGTON, June 6. The most important diplomatic paper since the European war began should reach the United States about June 29. It will be the German reply to President Wilson's latest note. Its importance will be derived from the fact that it will be the first definite step, not merely toward preserving peace between the United States and Germany, but toward ending the conflict that has raged in Europe since August.

This was the opinion in German diplo-matic circles today and it was shared by other diplomats.

The expected lapse of time between the sending of the American note and the re-ceipt of the reply will be due to the fact that Germany will await the arrival of Anton Meyer Gerhard, envoy, from Am-bassador Bernstorff to the Foreign Of-fice, before preparing a reply. Dr. Ger-hard should reach Copenhagen June 15 and Berlin about 12 hours later. Five days is little enough time for him to ac-complish his purpose, it is explained. When the German answer arrives it is declared it will mark the point-reached in all great wars-where diplomacy be-sins to take hold and force begins to list so, Up to the present, through 10 months of devastating warfare. BULLET THROUGH BRAIN **KILLS WILLIAM WATT,** BANKING FIRM CASHIER

Husband's Body Lying in Pool of Blood in Second Story of Home, Revolver Nearby.

William C. Watt, cashier of the bank-ing firm of E. W. Clark & Co., 321 Chest-nut street, and a member of the Union League and other prominent clubs, shot and killed himself at his home, 426 West Stafford street, Germantown, early today.

Mr. Watt was 53 years old. He and Mrs. Watt ivas 54 years old. He and Mrs. Watt lived at the Stafford street address with their 25-year-old daughter. They were members of the Philadelphia Cricket Club. Mr. Watt was a member of the Union League and a former treas-

Last evening Mrs. and Miss Watt went out, Mr. Watt saying he wished to etay at home to read an absorbing book. When they returned Mrs. Watt found her hus-band lying in a pool of blood in his room at the front of the second story of the house. He was fully dressed, part of his body lying in the doorway of a large closet. closet
