

## MACKS PLAY EXTRA INNINGS; PHILS GET LEAD ON CUBS; HARVARD DEFEATS PENN

### ITALIANS RUSH ON GORIZIA IN THREE DRIVES

Invaders Follow Up Gradisca Victory by Fierce Assaults on Next Objective.

Bersaglieri Make Desperate Attempt to Cross Isonzo River and Outflank Austrian Positions—Bombardment of Tolmino Continues.

Three Italian armies have been hurled against the Gorizia line, following the capture of Gradisca, on the Isonzo River, by the invaders. In addition, Bersaglieri forces are endeavoring to cross the Isonzo near Rubbia and attack Gorizia on the flank. The bombardment of Tolmino is continuing without interruption. The Italians are striving to occupy the town and seize the railroad running south to Trieste. The Italians are concentrating their efforts in the capture of important Austrian positions on the Isonzo, with the end in view of capturing all the railroads leading to Trieste and cutting off the Austrian lines of communication.

The fighting in the Trentino has abated somewhat in the last 48 hours. The Italians are proceeding with their advance on Trent from Rovereto, which they occupied a few days ago.

An official statement by the War Office states that the Austrian armies are completely demoralized by their defeats and that the Austrian command is having a great deal of trouble in preventing desertions and rehabilitating the morale of the soldiers.

Italian forces have occupied Porto Rosga, south of Monfalcone. Porto Rosga contains a large shipyard.

ROME, June 12.—Three Italian armies are closing in upon Gorizia, capital of the Austrian province of that name, and a fierce battle is now raging west of the city upon a ten-mile front.

The city is being shelled by Italian batteries stationed north of Moesa. The Austrians are retreating.

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### BRITAIN READY TO PAY U. S. OWNERS OF SEIZED CARGOES

LONDON, June 12.—As a result of agitation in the United States over British interference with American shipping, particularly in the matter of cotton cargoes, the following statement was issued today by the Foreign Office:

"Whenever claimants prove their ownership of cotton seized by England an advance of 10 cents per pound is being paid. Recently \$25,000 was paid in this manner. It is hoped that \$500,000 more will be paid out on Monday or Tuesday. One claimant has been paid in full. All claimants are requested to furnish documents showing ownership. The British Government is willing and anxious to effect an immediate settlement in all cases."

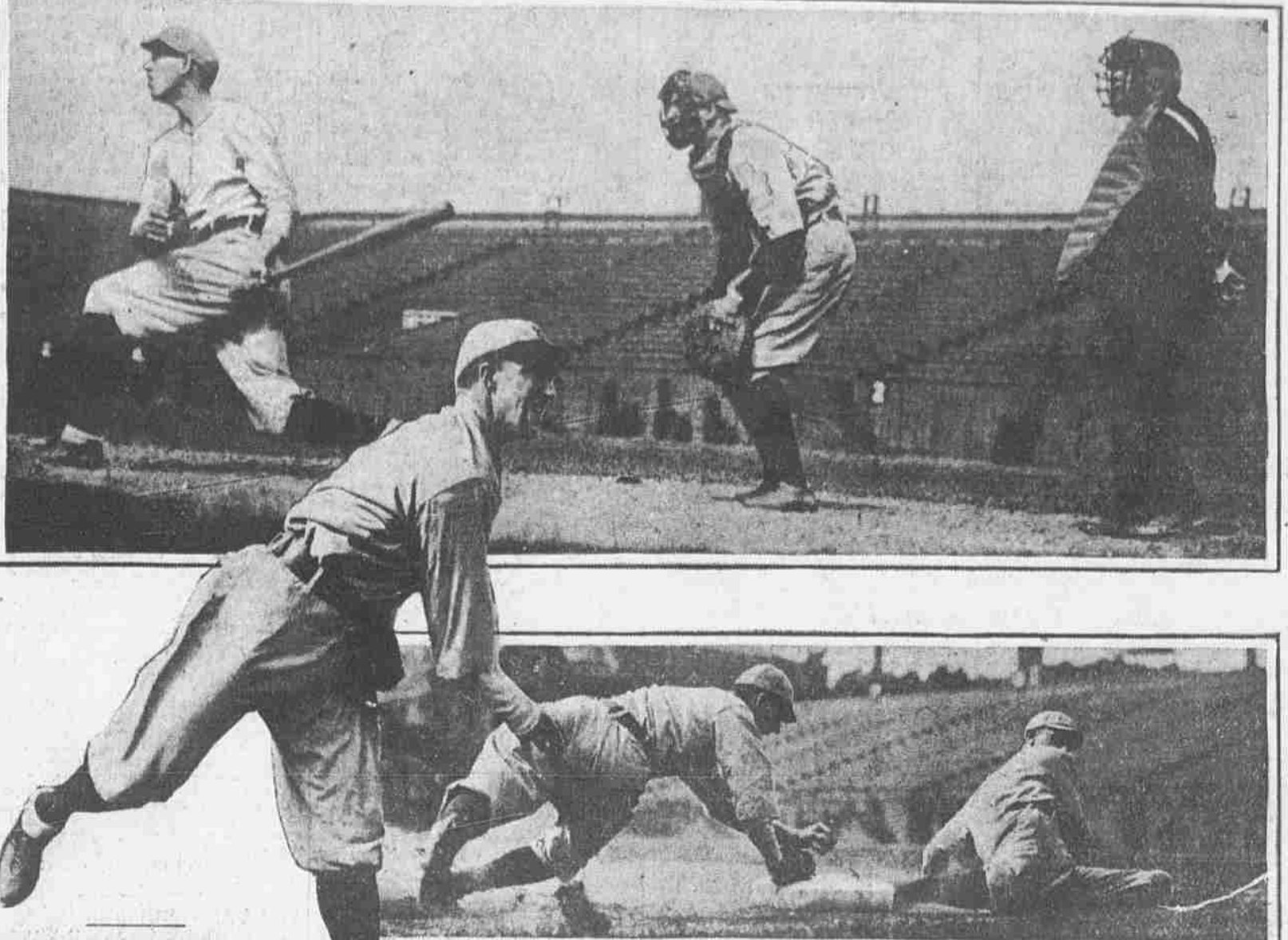
### Willie Brown Beats Higgins

### GOVERNOR ADDRESSES ALLENTOWN CHILDREN

Pelted With Roses by Great Crowd of Boys and Girls.

ALLENTOWN, Pa., June 12.—To be pelted with roses by 5,000 Allentown school children was the pleasing experience this morning of Governor Martin G. Brumbaugh, who is in this city in the interest of the playground movement. A committee headed by P. B. Rube and Mr. Malloy, president and vice president of the playground association, with a party of about 25, went to Philadelphia this morning to meet the Governor and bring him to Allentown over the line of the Lehigh Valley Transit Company. President Sparks of State College, Commissioner of Labor John Furman Jackson and Private Secretary Furman were in the party.

At Lansdale 2000 school children had assembled. A bouquet four feet high was presented to the Governor by Miss Charlotte Striker, daughter of Julius Striker, president of the Board of Trade. The Boy Scouts were there, and the Camp Fire Girls, too.

Stops were made at Souderton and Sellersville, the party arriving in Allentown at exactly 12 o'clock. Luncheon was served at the Livingston Club, at which the Governor and his party were guests of Colonel Harry C. Trexler and Colonel E. M. Young, of the Governor's staff.

After the luncheon there was an automobile trip to visit the playgrounds. Judge Frank M. Trexler presided at the meeting which followed in West Park, introducing the Governor, who spoke on "The Education of the Child to the Community."

At 4 o'clock the Governor left in his auto for Philadelphia.

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
