BIG STEEL DEAL DENIED

Cambria-Pennsylvania Merger Story Declared Baseless.

The Pennsylvania and Cambria Steel Comparies are not to be merged into a \$20,000,000 corporation. This emphatic de-nial of rumors in financial circles was made today by W. H. Donner, president of the Cambria Company when seen in his

offices in the Morris Building. "There is not the slightest particle of truth to the whole thing," Mr. Donner "No consolidation of the companies has ever been considered by the manage ment interests."

Cther officials of the company were equally emphatic in their denials of the reports, which first appeared in Pittsanth after the recent decision in the Government antitrust suit. The dis-patches from that city state that definite negotiations for the consolidation will be taken early next week, and Mr. Donner was mentioned as the man to head the consbine. The new concern was to take the name of the Pennsylvania Steel Company, the report added. Financiers, however, are loath to dis-

Financiers, however, are joath to dis-credit entirely the reports. They feel cer-tain that the corporation lawyers will find some way to join the two concerns, in which Henry C. JUDGE GRAY INVOKES PEACE IN LAW'S NAME

Eminent Jurist Tells N. J. Bar United States Should Lead Way.

ATLANTIC CITY, June 11-"How lamentable it seems that all the hopeful efforts made during the last decade toward accomplishing permanent peace among the nations of the earth, efforts that were engaging the best thought and experience of the civilized world, should have been so cruelly interrupted by the unprecedented savagery of war, which in some of its practices seems little less than a reversion to barbarism," exclaimed former Judge George Gray, of

Delaware, discussing international law before the New Jersey Bar Association here this morning. "Amid all the savagery and lawlessness

which have been engendered by this unprecedented strife, respect for international law has not entirely perished; its precepts are still appealed to by the

warring nations and its obligations are recognized even in their violation. A large, if not the larger part of the rules of international law concern the rights Personal property of Busan L. passions are too apt to make them heedless of all else than their own selfish purposes. "Never before in our eventful history

conditions so exigent for our country to assert the rights that belong to a neutral nation and to invoke the principles of that great body of law whose existence and development has been one of the crowning glories of our civilization. It is for us as never before to stand up for and assert the vital character and binding force of the obligations which this law has imposed upon belligerent na-tions for the protection of neutral rights. doing so we are performing a service the world and humanity and even to the bellgerent nations themselves, who, when the passions of war have subsided, will recognize that their own essential rights and interests have been preserved. 


