# REPRISAL RAID OVER ENGLAND KILLS FIFTEEN

Zeppelin's Bombs Sweep Northeast Coast in Ninth Deadly Foray.

Fifteen Wounded Heighten Heaviest Casualty List Since Air Assaults Began Last January-Six Dead Highest Previous Total.

LONDON, June 16. switching their zone of operations the Germans made a devastating air raid ever the northeast coast of England last night, killing at least 15 persons, wounding 15 others and causing fires. This is the third air assault on Britain this

Official announcement of this raid was made today by the Admiralty.

According to the official statement, "15 persons were killed, 15 were wounded and fires were caused by incendiary bombs dropped from the Zeppelins."

This is the heaviest loss of life recorded in any of the nine Zeppelin raids on Eng-

In the June 1 bombardment of London (the seventh raid) six persons lost their Byes. In the first raid, January 19, over the Norfolk coast, the Zeppelin marauders exacted a toll of five lives. In the hat previous raid, June 4 (the eighth), fire were killed.



## 900 PENN STUDENTS HEAR PROF. SCHELLING DEMAND 'FREE SPEECH

Largest Class to Leave University Founded by Franklin in Its 175 Years of Life Listen to Advocate of Academic Liberty.

An army of 900 students—the largest class graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in its 175 years of existence—received degrees today at the commencement exercises held in the Metropolitan Opera House, after hearing an address by Prof. Felix Emanuel Schelling, head of the English Department, in which he made a stern demand for academic freedom of speech and in thinly velled allusion, delivered an attack on the national policies of Germany.

"A teacher does not abdicate his right of onlying as a man, even in the things

"A teacher does not address to the things in which he is not expert, when he decides to walk that straight—and, some would have it, narrow—path wherein walks the teacher." Doctor Schelling said. We do not demand of the lawyer that he express himself only on the law, nor of the moneyed man that he discourse only on finance. We allow to the clergy-man a latitude of opinion on all subjects, save religion, wherein his fellows of the oth may be trusted to hold him to a strict accountability. Then why should we not demand for the teacher a simstrict accountability. ilar freedom of speech and opinion?" he naked.

"In this land of freedom of speech and unaccountability as to any lawful action,

# ITALIANS OPEN **NEW INVASION** THROUGH PASS

Cadorna's Army Undertakes Desperate Maneuver Via Stelvio Road.

Powerful Fortifications in Region of Monfalcone Canal Stem Advance of Latins Upon Trieste-Rome Admits

ROME, June 16.-The Italians have un-ROME, June 18.—The Italians have undertaken a new invasion of Austria through Stelvio Pass. Furious fighting is in progress there, with the Italians attacking the summits of the pass, which are still in Austrian hands and are defended with heavy guns. The Italians are attempting to seize the railway line running southward through the pass from Romio.

from Bormio.

"Powerful enemy defensive works," the War Office admitted in an official statement today, have halted the Italian advance toward Trieste from the direction of Monfalcone.

Strong Austrian batteries, concealed in old stone quarries along the region of the Monfalcone Canal, shelled Bersaglieri troops vigorously. The enemy was immediately engaged by Italian batteries posted at Monfalcone and in "the feeling out" process the Italian artillery commanders discovered that the roads from Monfalcone south to Trieste bristle with big guns. The battle for Garitsia continues without cessation. But General Cadorna's dispatches today carried few details of the fighting, declaring only that the artillery duel before Gorizia is "proceeding satisfactorily."

Fierce bayonet fightins is occurring all along the Carnia frontier, today's official bulletin reported.

Italian troops are within 25 miles of Toblach, through which passes the only direct railway link of communication bef Monfalcone. Strong Austrian batteries, concealed in

# MAN MURDERS WIFE THEN KILLS HIMSELF

Drink-Crazed Textile Worker Slashes Woman, Chases Son, and Then Takes Own Life.

Benjamin Fendell, 48 years old, a textile worker, murdered his wife and then mitted suicide following a drunken in the kitchen of their home, 1937 Tasker street, this aftern

treet, this afternoon. Fendell attacked his wife with a razor slashed her throat, then made an uncuscessful attempt to kill his 3-year-old son, Earl, and finally cut his own throat after following the dying woman into the yard in the rear of their home, where he fell prostrate over her body. He died in St. Agnes' Hospital a half hour later. Fendell and his wife, according to the police, had been quarrelling for several weeks. This afternoon they were drink-

weeks. This atternaon they were drinking in their kitchen. A quarrel staited,
and the tragic events followed quickly.
The boy was in the room at the time,
and when he tried to intercede between
his drink-crazed father and mother, the
former turned on him.

Mrs. Fendell ran into the yard, the

blood streaming from her wounds, with her son and his father at her heels. The lad was able to escape into a neighbor's lad was able to escape into a neighbor a yard before his father could catch him. Fendell atopped short, viewed the body of his wife and then committed suicide. The police of the 20th and Federal streets station say the Fendells have been causing a great deal of trouble. Mrs. Fendell was arrested last week for distriction the peace. Two other sons surturbing the peace. Two other sons sur-vive the dead pair. They are Theodore, 14, and Benjamin, 18.
