WILMINGTON COUNTRY CLUB, Del., June 18.—But one Wilmington golfer, Arthur M'George, won in the first round of the Middle Atlantic Golf Association championship at the Wilmington Country Club today, and his advance was at the expense of another local player, H. P. Scott, Jr. At that moment M'George was forced to play 20 holes before he could claim the victory.

Another extra-hole contest was played between George Small, of Baltimore, the clubholder, and Allan Lard, of Chevy Chase, Small coming through on the 18th hole.

A. Warren Corkran, of Baltimore, winner of yesterday's qualification round, and Donald Woodward, who just barely qualified, had an most interesting match with the Baltimorean winning, 2 up and 1 down. Woodward held his resources in play pretty well in the first nine holes and at the turn was one down. He earned the match on the tenth, where Corkran took three putts, but was one down on the tenth. From then on Corkran retained his lead and added to it by winning the 13th and 17th, where the match ended. They played out the remaining holes, and Corkran broke 90 by putting down a sizeable putt for a two.

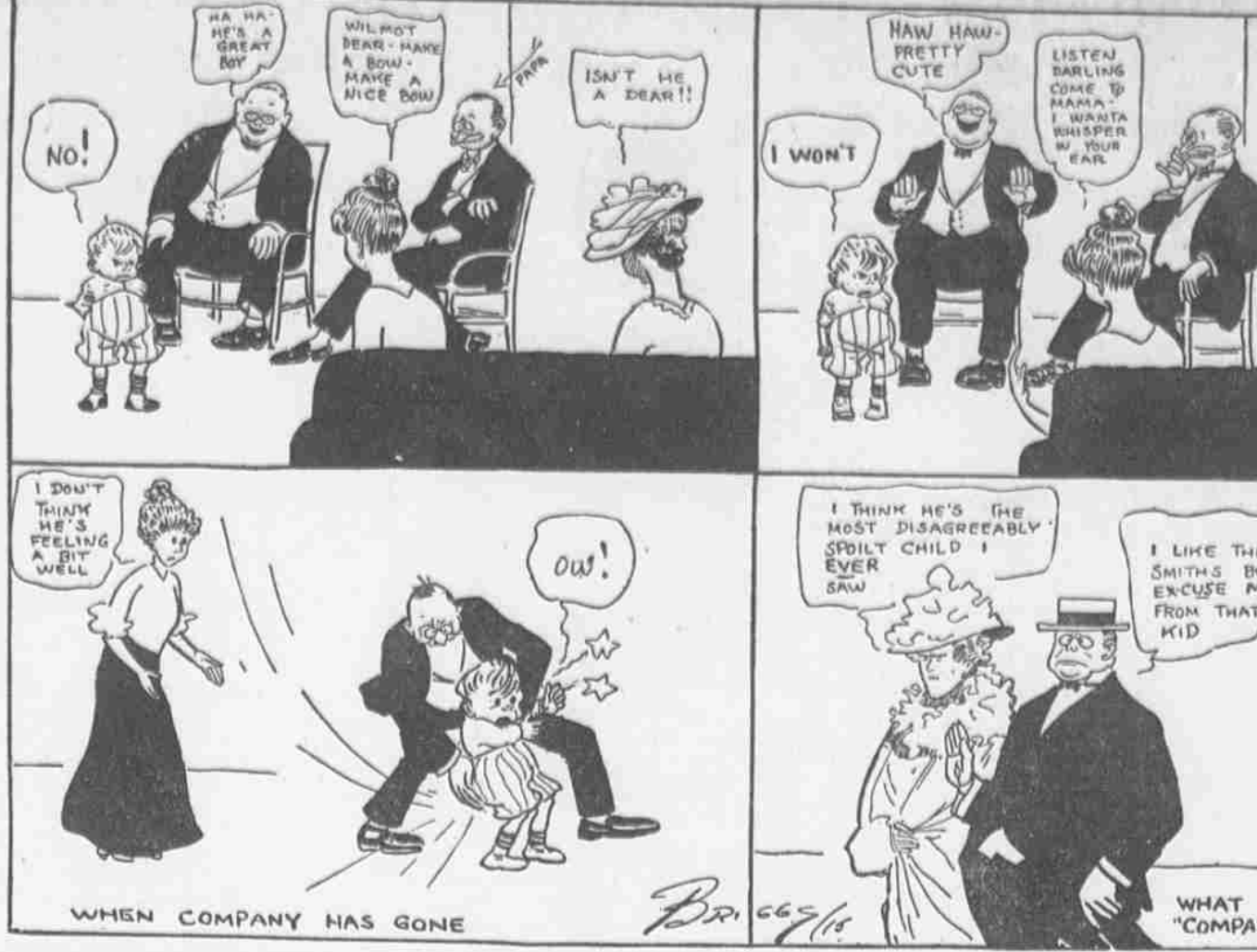
