

FANO BOMBARDATA DA UNA SQUADRA NEMICA; GORIZIA IN PERICOLO

Le Truppe del Generale Cadorna Avanzano nel Trentino e nella Carnia. Seicento Austriaci Fatti Prigionieri.

Malborghetto. Le nostre granate hanno innescato un passaggio che univa le opere inferiori a quelle superiori e la piattaforma coperta di una batteria nemica è stata danneggiata gravemente.

Le nostre truppe danno maggiori particolari della brillante azione svolta dai nostri soldati nella regione di Monte Nero nella notte del 15. L'assalto fu eseguito con grandi difficoltà ed i nostri uomini furono costantemente sotto il fuoco del nemico. Il numero totale dei prigionieri fatti dai nostri ammonta a 500. Noi abbiamo preso al nemico anche moltissimi fucili e due mitragliatrici.

Nel pomeriggio di mercoledì un battaglione ungherese eseguì un violento attacco contro le nostre posizioni a Zakras, nella zona di Monte Nero, ma fu respinto. Gli italiani fecero successivamente alcuni contrattacchi che finirono con la distruzione del battaglione ungherese.

Lungo il fiume Isone la nostra offensiva procede metodicamente e le nostre truppe nella regione di Piava hanno occupato un gran tratto di territorio dopo una lunga e sanguinosa lotta. Le nostre posizioni sono state consolidate e tutti gli attacchi del nemico sono stati respinti. In altri punti del fronte dell'Isone si sono avuti solo duelli di artiglieria a lunga distanza. La stazione ferroviaria di Gorizia è stata in parte distrutta dai nostri colpi di artiglieria e di carri ferroviari è stata incendiata.

SUL FRONTE DEL TRENTO

Nel settore del Trentino gli italiani hanno virtualmente occupato la cittadina di Mori, importante posizione sulla strada che da Rovereto porta a Riva. Questo tratto di strada è nominato assai difficile e giacché gli austriaci hanno eretto fortificazioni dappertutto dove hanno potuto trovare una posizione elevata.

Occorrerà perciò smantellare queste fortificazioni prima di procedere. Nella Alpi Carniche continua il duello di artiglieria notte e giorno. Quando sovrappioggia la notte il tiro dei cannoni è reso possibile in quanto si sta a guerra austriaci sono riusciti a portare grossi cannoni contro le posizioni occupate dagli italiani in queste montagne, ma gli italiani hanno potuto finora mantenere la loro superiorità.

Truppe di fanteria, Alpi e guardie di Finanza fanno spesso attacchi di sorpresa contro gli austriaci ed in alcuni casi li obbligano ad arrendersi senza combattere. Essi avanzano verso trincee considerate imprendibili per sentieri sconosciuti, noti soltanto ai contrabbandieri di professione ed alle guardie di Finanza e vincono con la rapidità della loro sorpresa. In questo modo sono state conquistate le montagne ad ovest ed a sud di Malborghetto e certe alture dalle quali si domina l'altopiano di Gail.

Arrest Two Under "Dope" Act

LANCASTER, Pa., June 15.—Jesse Sipe, a cigar-store proprietor, and Harry Swank, a garage employe, were arrested Saturday while in the act of taking hypodermic injections of morphine. The police say that a number of tablets were found on Sipe, rendering him liable to prosecution under the Harrison "dope" act. The police say they have evidence that the morphine came from a hospital or drug store here, but the prisoners refuse to tell where they obtained it.

GRAND JURY INDICTS STAHL FOR PERJURY

Lusitania Affidavit Maker to Face Trial — Remitted to Tombs.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Gustav Stahl, German reservist, today was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury for perjury in connection with his affidavit that the Cunard liner Lusitania carried guns.

Other indictments against two other persons may have been returned simultaneously, but Stahl was alone when he was brought from the Tombs and arraigned in the United States District Court.

In his affidavit, Stahl swore that he saw four 6-inch guns mounted on the Lusitania on April 30, when she sailed from this port on her last voyage when a German submarine sent her to the bottom off the Irish coast, with more than 100 American lives.

Stahl, represented by counsel, pleaded not guilty and was held for trial. His bail, \$20,000, was not furnished and he was returned to the Tombs, where he has been confined since his arrest, which preceded his testimony before the grand jury.

Secret service men and attaches of the Bureau of Navigation were witnesses against Stahl, but the most damaging evidence against him, it was said, was given by Daniel Jenney, his roommate, who told of the alleged relations among Stahl, the two Harberberg brothers, now missing, and Paul Koenig, of the Hamburg-American line.

Death of Husband's Death Verified

LANCASTER, Pa., June 15.—Mrs. John MacGregor, of this city, last night dreamed that her husband was standing by her bedside, and he looked like a dead person. A few hours later a telegram was received informing her of his death at Rockville, near Harrisburg, yesterday afternoon by the collapse of a school building on which he was working.
