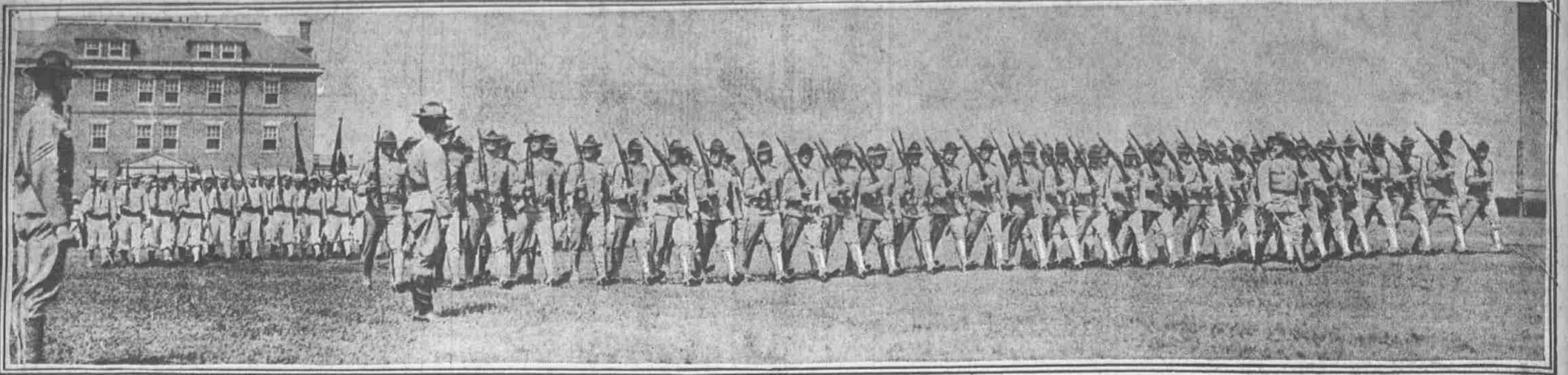

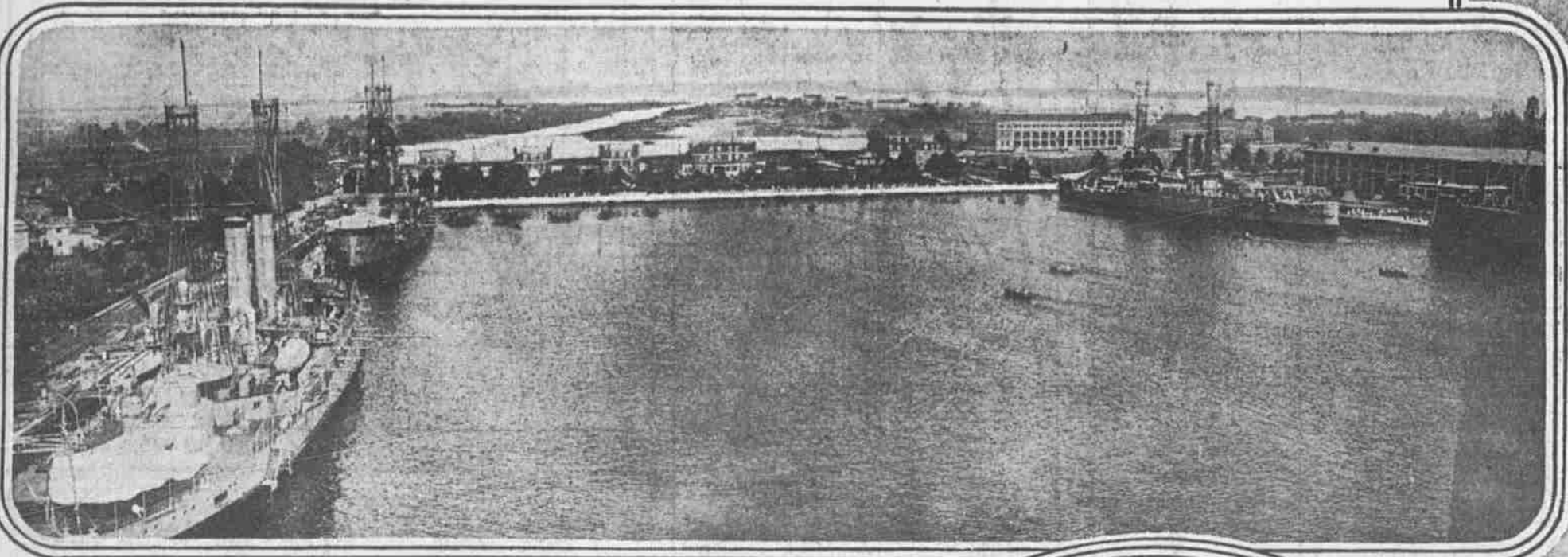

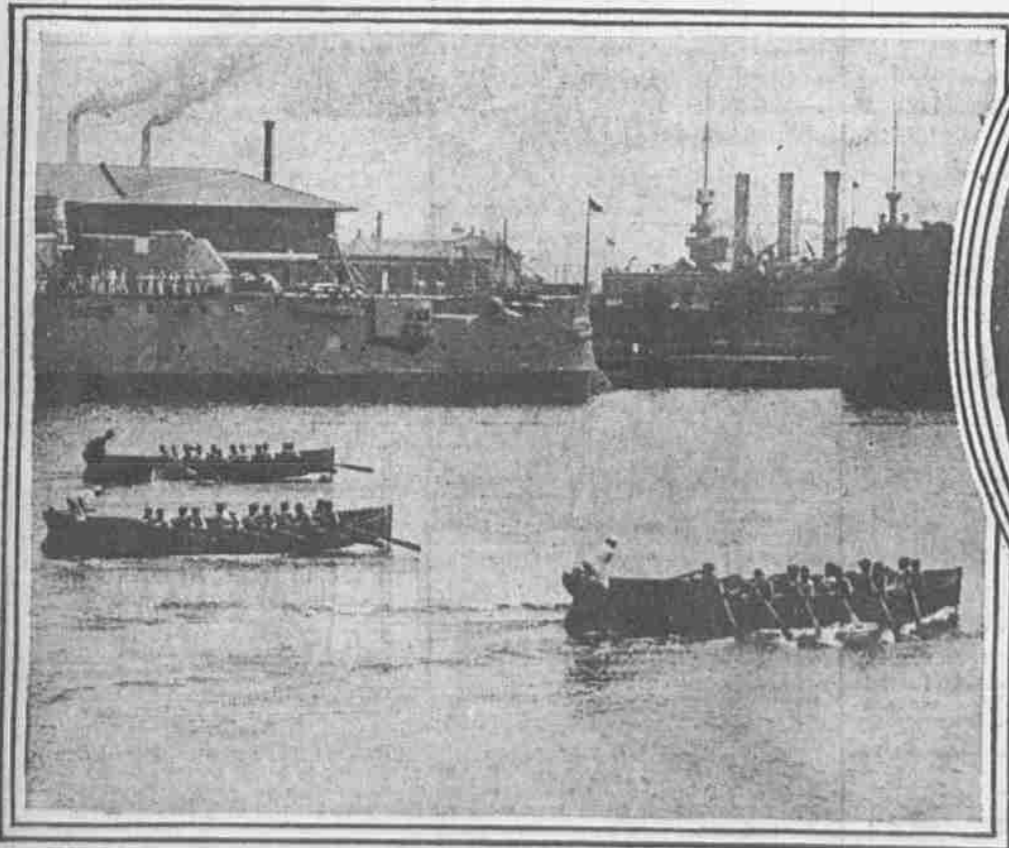
MARINES IN IMPRESSIVE MANEUVERS AT LEAGUE ISLAND NAVY DAY

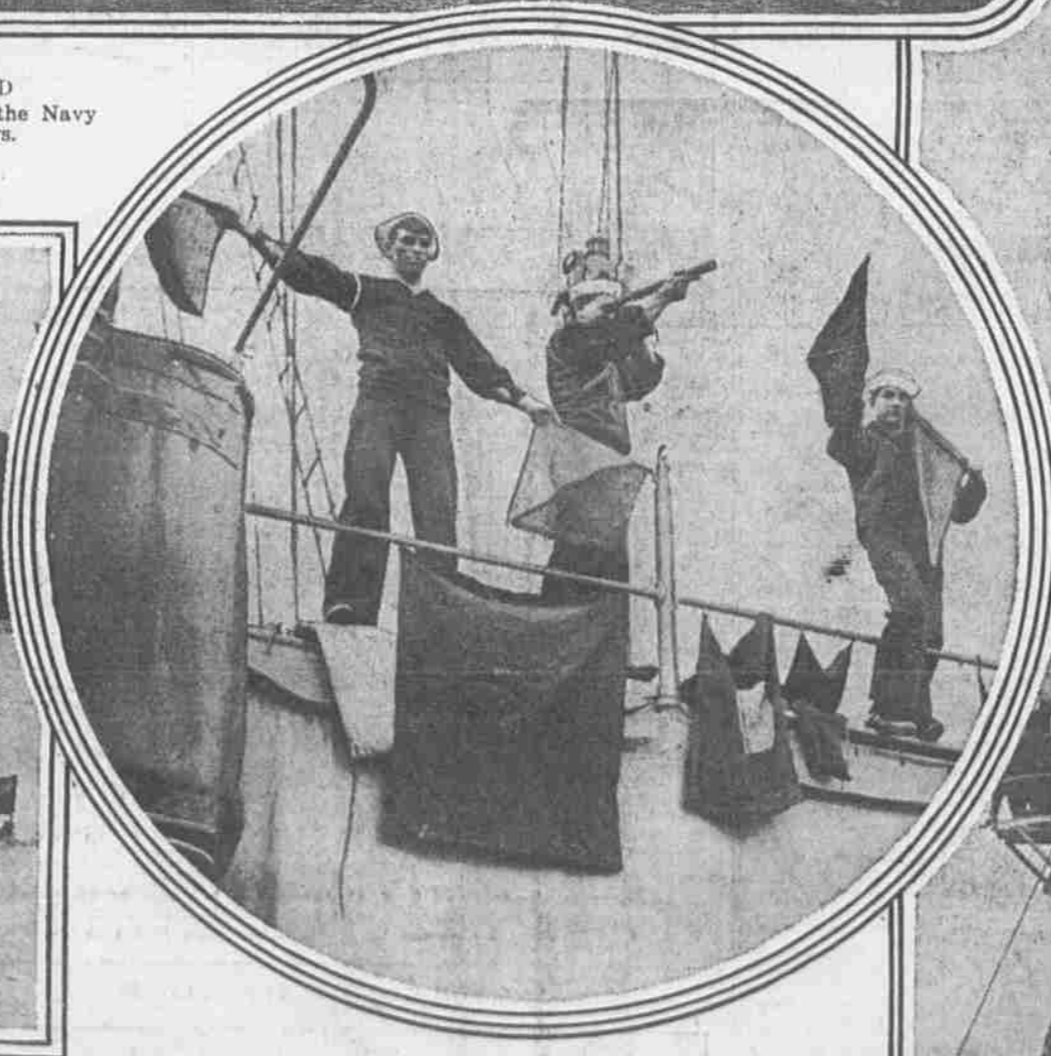
A PANORAMIC VIEW OF THE BACK BASIN AT LEAGUE ISLAND

This picture was taken from the fighting top of one of the battleships now at the Navy Yard. It shows, incidentally, the final spurt in a race between two dinghys.



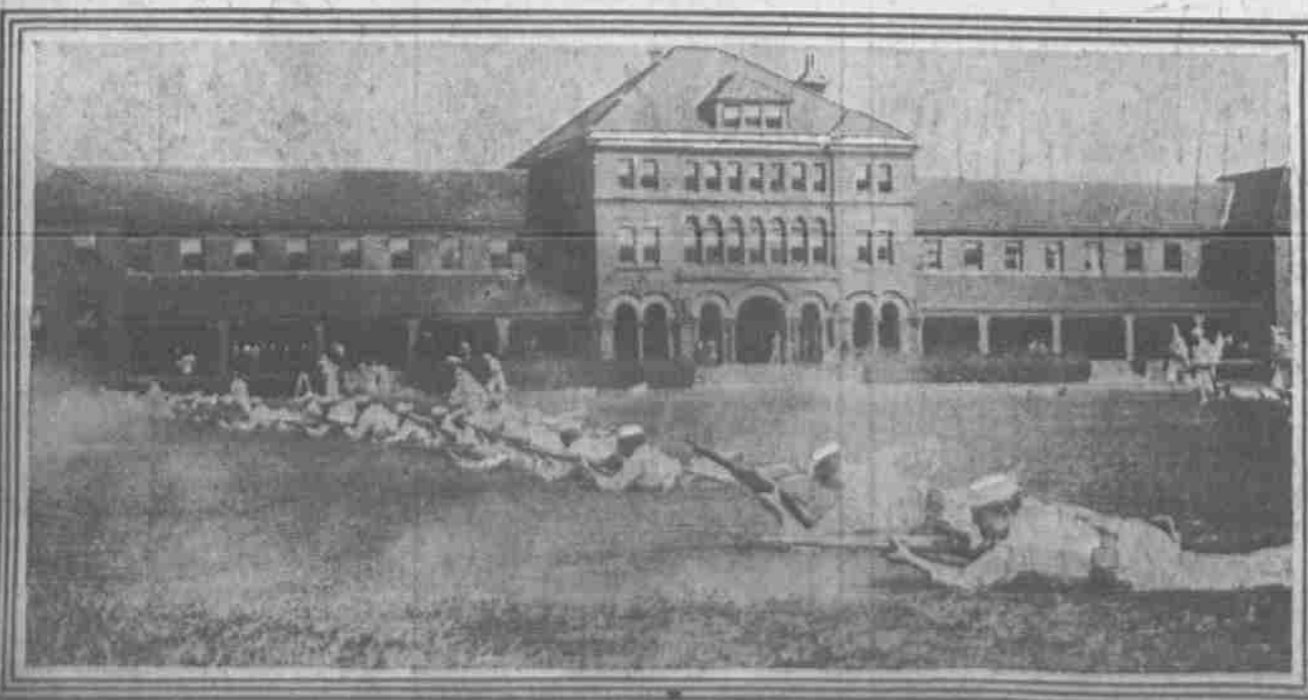
RACING IN LONG BOATS IS A FEATURE OF THE DAY

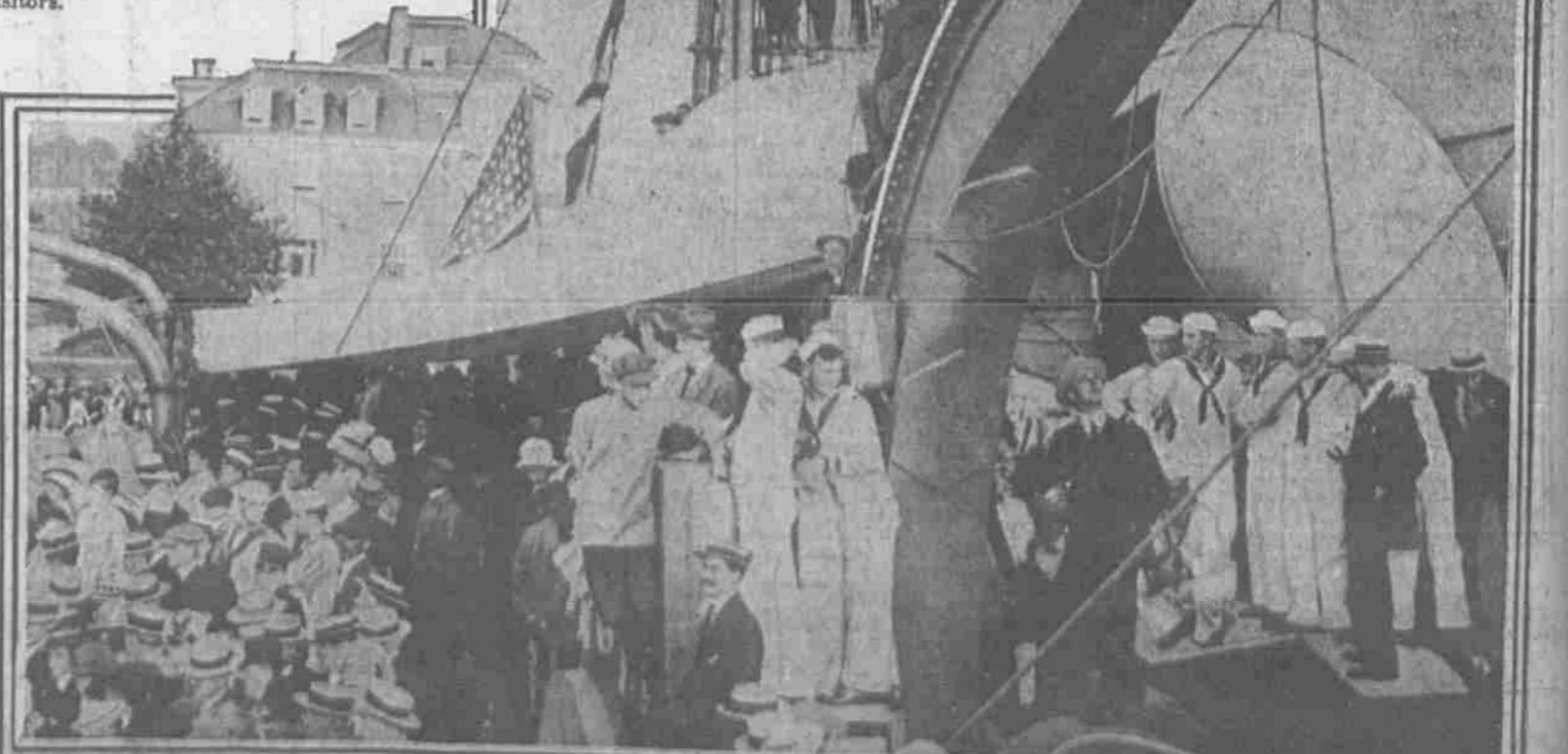
SIGNALING
