AUTOIST UNDER BAIL FOR ACCIDENT

FINDS HIS SHOP A PILE OF ASHES

LAD CRUSHED FIRST DAY AT WORK

A boy, on his first day of employment, was crushed by a freight elevator and may die as the result of his injuries. He is Edward Heffernan, 15 years old, of 1814 Hamilton street. Just before quitting time, in the McCambridge-Cooper Company, 215 North 20th street, Heffernan was taking a load of pipes to an upper floor and was jammed against the ceiling of the first floor.

STEPS FROM "JITNEY"; HIT BY ANOTHER

Joseph Pearl, 29 years old, of 5919 Arch street, was seriously injured last night when he alighted from a "jitney" and stepped directly in the path of another. Pearl, who was riding south on Broad street, alighted at South street. A "jitney" driven by Ernest Schrock, of 1319 South Hutchinson street, struck him. He was taken to the Howard Hospital, where it was found he had several fractured ribs and possibly a fractured skull.

"FAKERS" POUND EACH OTHER AT CHESTER CARNIVAL

Entertainment of a different nature than anticipated was accorded visitors at the Carnival Grounds at Chester last night. Two "fakers" began fighting, and one of them hit the other over the head with a claw hammer. An aroused bystander pulled a revolver from his pocket, and for a time it looked as if there might be a riot. The injured man, after getting his wound fixed up, returned and pummeled his opponent a while with his fists, but the affair, which had its inception in an argument over room rent, was fixed up before the police arrived.

AUTO FILLS STREET WITH VEGETABLE SALAD

Vegetables were scattered across Broad street at Columbia avenue early today when an automobile, being tested by Henry Hannum, of 1428 Christian street, struck a huckster wagon, throwing the driver, Albert Lincetto, of 3044 North 21st street, into the street and knocking down the horse. The automobile then brought up against a hitching post, Hannum having lost control. Neither man was hurt.

HELD FOR ROBBING TRUSTFUL EMPLOYER

Wallace Hancock, for five years a trusted employe of Hanson Brothers, manufacturers of printers' plates, at 704 Sansom street, was arrested today near his place of employment, carrying a bag containing \$50 worth of copper. In the last year the firm has lost \$7000 worth of this material.

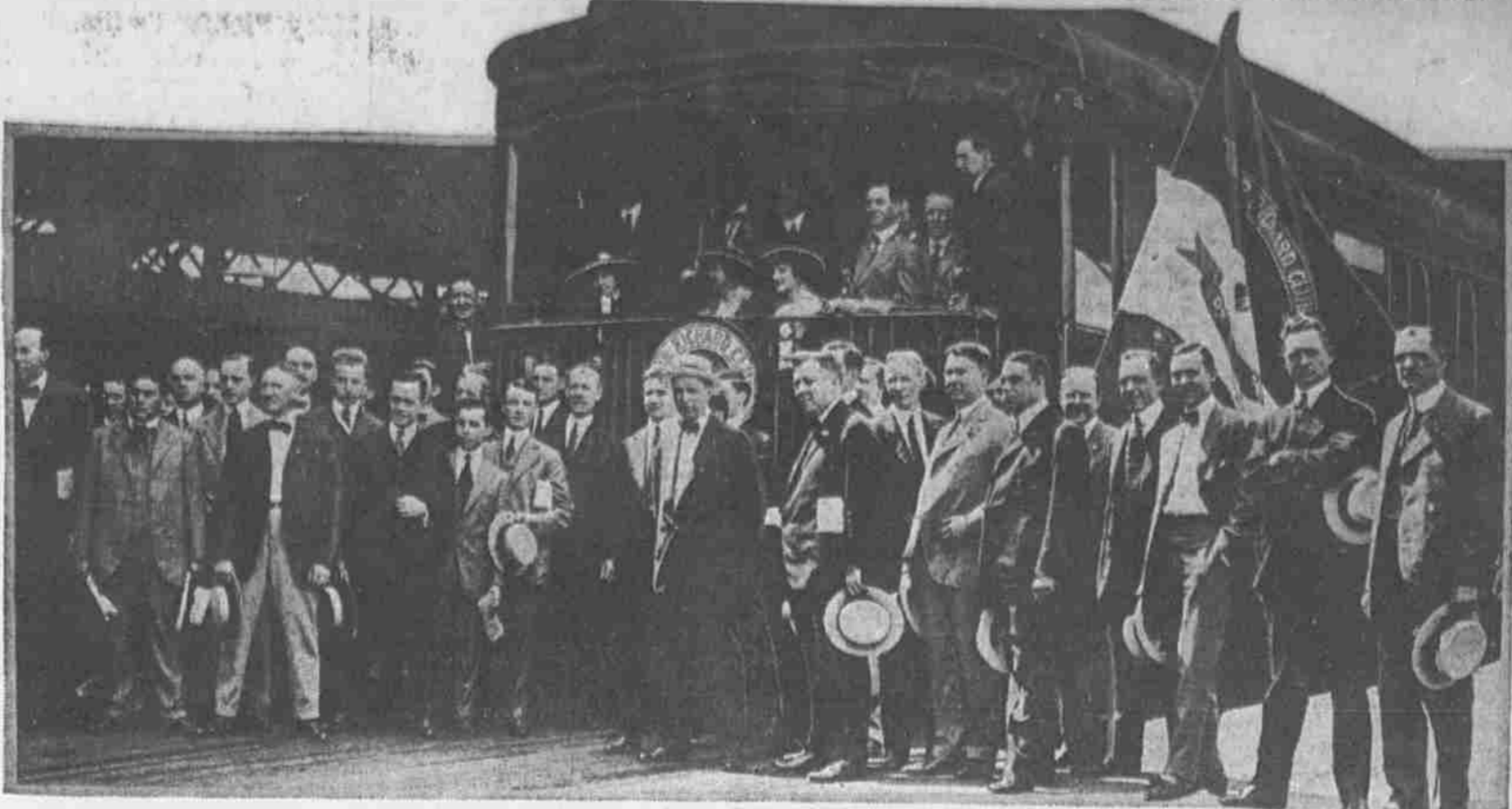
Accused Man Escaped From Asylum

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"DOPE" PEDDLER SHOT WHEN DEN IS RAIDED

Wounded Man Drops in Tracks After Running 50 Yards With Drugs in Suitcase.

One man was shot early today in a raid of police and internal revenue agents at 1122 Wallace street and another man and two women were captured. The police found a suitcase they said was full of cocaine, heroin, morphine and apparatus for use of the drugs.

The injured man is Lawrence Coyle. He told Acting Detectives Weckesser and Ernest, of the 10th and Buttonwood streets station, and Deputy Internal Revenue Agent John W. Glover that he wanted to get some clothing when they raided the house and arrested him.

The other prisoners are John Nugent, Anne Nugent and Mrs. Lillian Davis. The first two men and wife, were held in \$500 bail each for further hearing Thursday by United States Commissioner Edmunds.

MAY FREE MOTHER OF FIVE

Bail Offered for Release of Chester Woman Who Killed Husband. Wealthy men in Chester are ready today to provide bail for Mrs. Elizabeth Durk, mother of five children, who shot and killed her husband, John F. Durk, when he threatened to take her life. The woman is still in custody, but it is probable habeas corpus proceedings will be instituted today by her attorney, John J. Stetser, to have her released on bail.

All Chester is sympathizing with the woman today. Because of this she has been able to bear up, but she is exceedingly nervous, and friends fear she will collapse under the nervous strain. The children, who are with Mrs. Durk's father, are constantly asking for her. The inquest will be held next Monday or Tuesday.

Facts Versus Fallacies

FACT is a real state of things. FALLACY is an apparently genuine but really illogical statement or argument.

NO GREATER FALLACY has been imposed upon public belief, to excite undue prejudice toward the use of liquors, than the stories that "destitution" and "wife desertion" and other miseries are in most instances the result of drink. These FALLACIES have been circulated regardless of substantiated official FACTS to the contrary. Study, for examples, recent data from two widely-separated municipalities:

THE 1914 Annual Report of the Rochester, N. Y., Department of Charities shows that of 3469 cases of destitution in that city, sickness was the cause of 1214 cases; unemployment the cause of 894; old age, 218; desertion, widows left with dependent children, blindness, insanity, etc., 1047 applied for charity. Of the entire total of 3469 cases of destitution in Rochester, during one year, only 166—less than five per cent.—were the result of alcoholism.

IN PORTLAND, Oregon, the same small ratio of liquor misuse is in evidence. During the winter of 1914-15, records were taken of 306 persons applying for aid to the Portland Associated Charities. Under primary causes, 28.7 per cent. of the cases were due to mental and physical incapacity, including illness, accidents, etc.; unemployment caused 23.9 per cent. of the instances of destitution; desertion, 15 per cent.; old age, non-support and other causes, 21.5 per cent. Of the 306 cases needing assistance, but 24, or only 7.8 per cent. were due to alcoholism. As for the contributory causes of these cases, they followed the same general lines as the primary causes, except that as a contributory factor alcoholism had an even lower percentage—only 4.59 per cent.

IT IS A FALLACY to think that excessive drink always causes poverty, when it is a FACT that, reversely, poverty is not unrequitely the most provocative cause of persons trying to drown their troubles in drink!
