Average Increase in Language 40 Per Cent—Italian Leads. The scholastic year of the Berlitz School, 16th and Chestnut streets, which has just ended, showed great increases in the amount of work done by pupils in all departments. The increase in the amount of work done by the students of various languages has been tabulated as follows: French, 50 per cent; German, 65 per cent; Spanish, 40 per cent; Italian, 70 per cent; miscellaneous, 15 per cent.
