The club sends out hundreds of dollars' worth of reading matter and postal cards each week. At each meeting an entertainment and refreshments are provided. Short speeches are made by members and the meeting ad-

There are no dues. Everything is free.

The club started to grow with amaging rapidity several works ago. Meetings were held at the clubhouse every Saturday night. The membership was 1200 on June 12. TORPEDO SINKS SHIP ARMENIAN

29 Lives Lost, Including Score of American Negroes on Victim of U-38.

Vessel Laden With Cargo of Horses for Allies Goes Down Off Cornwall-Second in Size to Lusitania of Undersea Raiders' Prey.

WASHINGTON, June 39. The steamship Armenian, carrying horses from the United States to England, was sunk by German submarine U-35 at 8:07 the night of June 28, accord Ing to State Department advices received here this afternoon.

Advices were conflicting, but indicated had been landed at Bristol, England, The Armenian was sunk 30 miles west by north of Trebos Head, Cornwall, and the State Department's advices came from American Consul Armstrong, at Bristol. According to Armstrong the ship's wire-less plant was shot away, which gave rise to the conjecture that the vessel was try-

ing to dodge the submarine.

The Armenian, it was stated at the State Department, on investigation, was med by the Dominion Line, a subsidiary of the Leyland Line. It called from New-port News June 17, bound for Aven-mouth, on the English west coast.

MAY CAUSE NEW CRISIS Government officials were not prepared to say, on short notice, what the ship's status would prove to be.

If it had been requisitioned by the Brit-ish Government or was chartered by it, the impression was that it would class a transport and be subject to the rules
