PHILADELPHIA CANOE CLUB IS PREPARING FOR ANNUAL MEET

Contests of the Atlantic Division of the American Canoe Association to Be Held in September—Representatives to Encamp on the Wissahickon.

THE Philadelphia Canoe Club is making preparations for the annual meet of the Atlantic Division of the American Canoe Association, which will take place in this city on September 4, 5 and 6. For the three days representatives of the canoe clubs from the division, which includes Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania and New Jersey, will encamp on the Wissahickon, adjoining Colony Castle, the clubhouse of the Philadelphia Club. The races will be held on Saturday, September 4, and Monday, September 6, and a program of varied interest will be arranged for Sunday, Dr. David J. Boon is commodore of the entertaining club; Mr. Howard R. Lord, vice commodore; Mr. Joseph W. Blair, secretary; Mr. Eugene H. Hunter, treasurer; Mr. Earle F. Kerber, quartermaster, and Mr. Alfred H. Kress, fleet captain. The board of directors includes the officers and Messrs. Arthur F. Ehringer, Frederick J. Ehringer, Otto R. Stoeckle, Howard F. Fell and George F. Eisenhardt.

The building, which is included in Fairmount Park, in time became the home of the Philadelphia Canoe Club, which has added a number of improvements, and the old structure, with its rosy parlor and large picturesque fireplace, is often used for dances and other social gatherings, while the shaded veranda affords a pleasant and cool place for the friends and relatives of the members to view the river and watch the races. At the last regular meeting of the Young Men's and Women's Hebrew Association, which took place on Tuesday evening at the Starr Garden, 6th and Lombard streets, it was decided to give its members and numerous friends an outing at Valley Forge on Sunday.
