



## HOW MUCH AND WHAT TO EAT: A PRACTICAL PROBLEM FOR EXPERTS IN DIET AND DIGESTION

Amount and Quality of Food Required by Fat Men, Women, Too, if You Please, and Their Leaner Brethren and Sisters, as Seen' From the Scientific View by Students in the Science of Gastronomy.

Should a fat man eat more than a her appetite proportionately to that of a benefit of those who may fall within the hin man? Should a big, muscular man of similar dimensions. thin man? Should a big, muscular man eat more than his diminutive companion at the lunch counter? Should a young man eat more than an old man? Or again, should a young man eat more than a young woman, or an old man more than a lady of equal age?

These questions and a host of others of a similar nature are keeping dictitians of this city busy at present, for they are propounded by a public which has come to a keen perception of the fact that there really are such things as digestive organs by the long-continued "hot spell." The non-hour luncheon and even the home-cooked dinner have come to be looked dipon with suspicion by the city dweller, who daily reads of heat prostrations, strokes and other terrible catasrophes numbering legion.

Inquiries among some of the leading physicians of this city show that the problem of how much to eat is a simple one for women. The average woman eats, or should eat, four-fifths as much food as the average man. On this basis it is easily seen that a woman six feet tall and weighing 200 pounds need only seek a man of like stature, who appears to be in good health, watch to see how much food he consumes and then eat four-fifths of that quantity herself. Similarly, a woman only five feet tall and weighing but 100 pounds should govern

vastly more intricate. It is a question of calories, proteins, fats and carbohydrates. For instance, Mr. Average Man requires proteids to the extent of 120 grains daily, about 50 grains of fats and not less than 500 grains of carbohydrates. These will represent a food value of about 500 grains.

Although it is generally conceded that the quantity of food required varies di-rectly with the weight of the individual, there are several important modifying factors, such as occupation, age and the like. The manual laborer, though he be of diminutive stature, requires more food than the young college-bred giant who sits at the bookkeeper's desk in an office, and it must be more substantial food, too. Hence the predominance of garlick sandwiches among the ditchdiggers.

Again, as to the effect of age, a prom-inent physician of this city asserted yesterday that "there is perfect agreement among those who have studied the ques-tion that after middle life the food re-'quired diminishes and in old age it is

much less than in youth."

This physician also pointed out that in summer carbohydrates, such as cereals, rice, potato, green vegetables, fruits and the like, should be used more freely than in winter. It was also admitted, however, that a certain amount of fat and of animal food should be employed in sum-mer as well as in winter. It was also pointed out that persons endowed with quantities of fat do not require the amount of food necessary to their slender brethren or those having a good muscular
