PUTTING OUT A BLAZE IN AN 80,000-GALLON OIL TANK WITH A SLENDER TREAM FROM A HOSE FULL OF LICORICE JUICE

A test was made at the plant of the Crew-Levick Company, in Chester, Pa., yesterday of a new chemical invention by W. W. Walker, of Camden. A lighted paper was thrown into the tank of inflammable liquid, which instantly burst into flames with characteristic heavy, black volumes of smoke, as shown on the right. Into the mass the inventor then turned his hose of "licorice juice," as he called it, and within a few minutes both flame and smoke were entirely conquered, as shown on the left. The inventor contends that his discovery will cause a revolution in old methods of fighting such fires.


