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

Faulty Wire Work Delays Inauguration of New Service and Results in Debit.

The Pennsylvania Railroad is losing alman, made a report of much interest to all the members, predicting that the event would be much larger than expected and most \$1000 daily because of the continued delay in putting the Main Line electrined. system in operation. tric trains would be put in operation on the Main Line some two months ago, a trial trip disclosed the fact that the short wires supporting the contact wires were lacking in tensile strength, several hunlacking in tensile strength, several hundreds of them being broken on the demonstration run. Experts pointed out that unless these supporting wires were replaced by heavier ones they would be a source of continuous trouble and expense to the railroad. The work of installing the new wires over the system began in the new wires over the system began im-mediately, but owing to difficulty in pro-curing the heavier wire the work has been delayed repeatedly. Officials of the company now believe that the electrified service may be put in operation within a
