

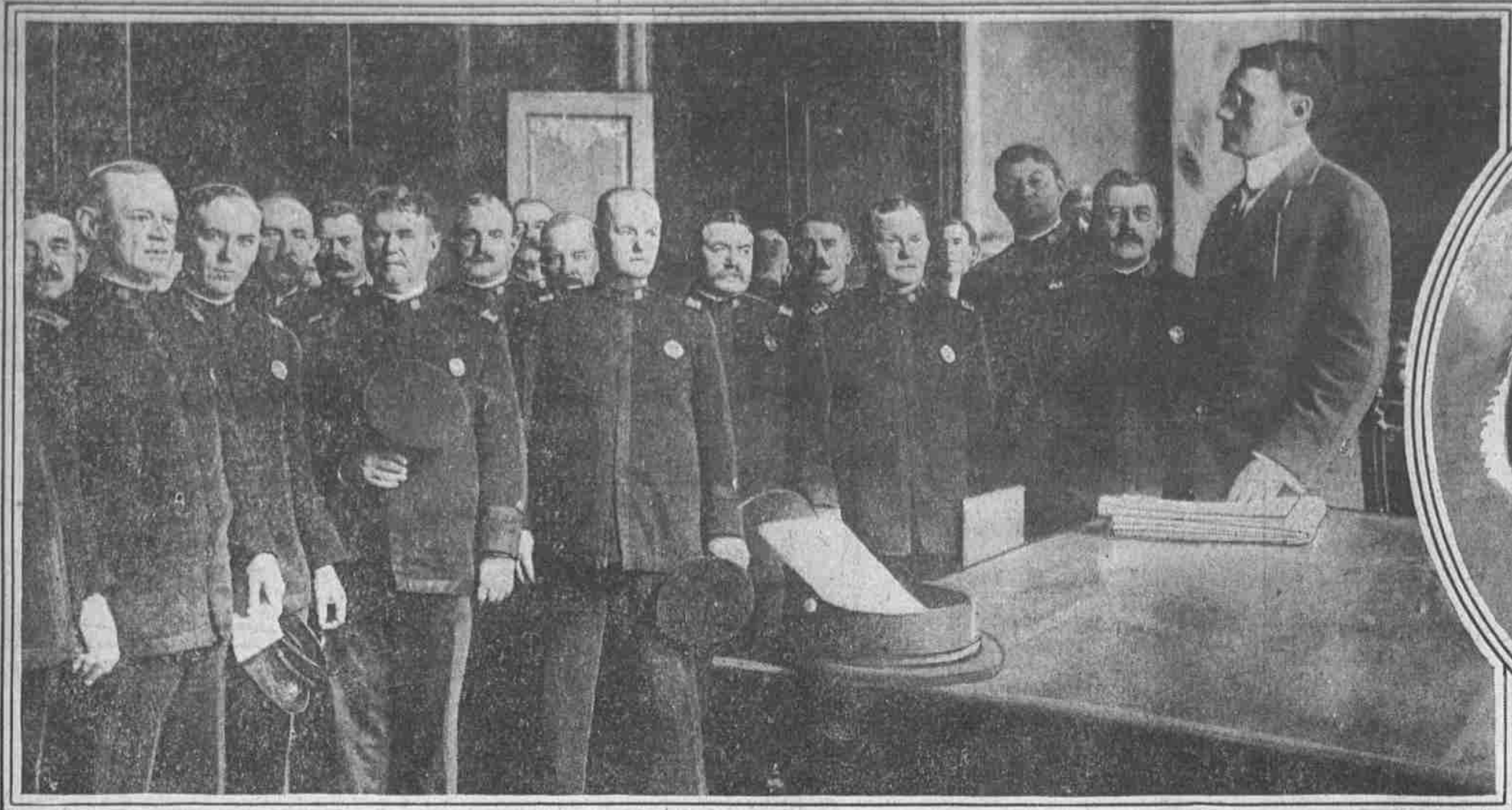

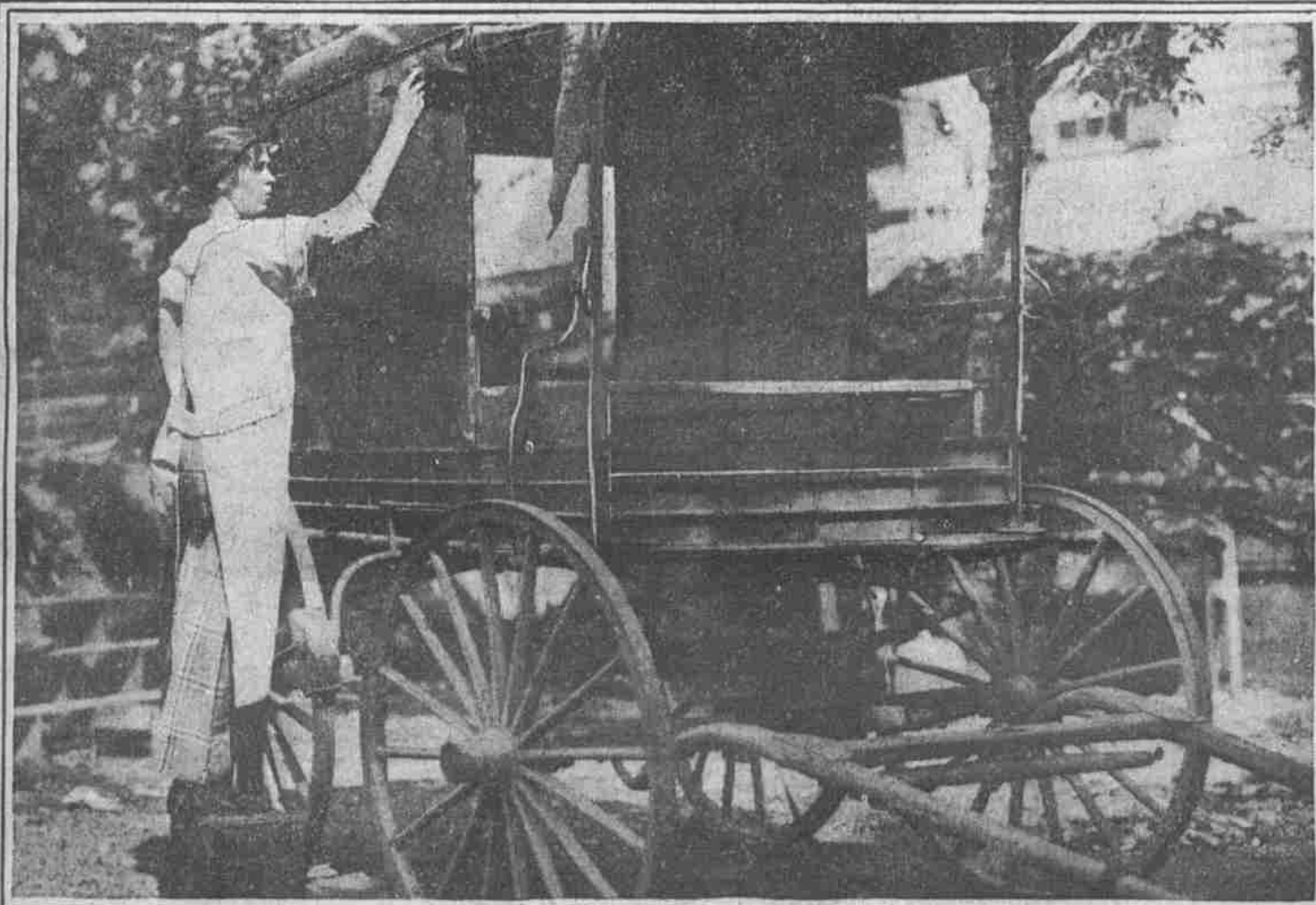
#### CLASS OF POLICE LIEUTENANTS LISTENS TO TEACHER-JUDGE

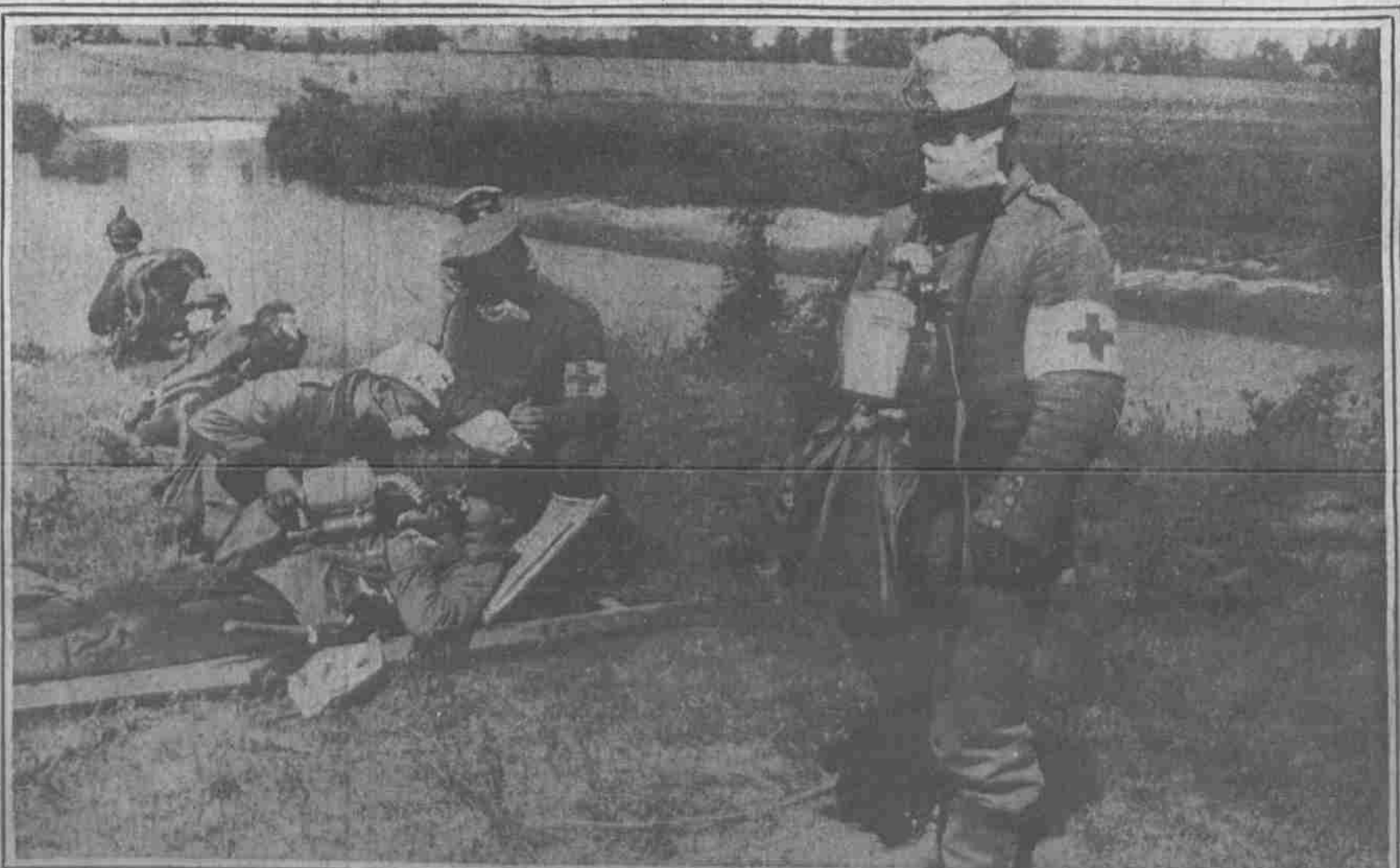
#### MISS MARCIA MURDOCK ENGAGED

#### SUFFRAGE SPEAKERS PROVE THEIR PRACTICAL ABILITIES IN PREPARATION FOR PROPAGANDA TOUR

Miss Gratia S. Erickson and Miss Grace Hillis are two young Philadelphia suffragist agitators, who are making a determined effort in behalf of votes for women. Showing true suffragist ability, Miss Erickson is quite able to paint the wagon in the suffrage color—yellow—while Miss Hillis touches up "Tommy," the horse that assists materially in their campaign.



#### GERMANS AND ALLIES BOTH PREPARED TO GUARD AGAINST ASPHYXIATING GASES IN TRENCH WARFARE

The French (on the left) are seen about to throw hand grenades. Their faces are heavily masked against the poisonous gases. Heavy helmets guard against injury from bursting shells overhead, and to complete the anti-death costume worn by the grenadiers, they wear a bullet-proof vest. The Germans in the opposite picture are also well protected against fumes that may break out of their own pipes and tanks. Notice the Red Cross officer carrying a bottle of liquid to rub on those who have succumbed to the gas.
