He was regarded as one of the foremost applicary law authorities in the United spaces.

The family has a long list of famous military men in its history. Colonel Porter's great-grandfather, General Andrew Porter, was famous in the Revolution, and his father was a noted general in the Civil War. His mother was a daughter of Major John Biddle, of the United States Army, and her grandfather was Chaples Biddle, of the Revolutionary Biddle, of the Revolutionary Charles Biddle, of Committee of Safety,

Colonel Biddle's widow was Miss Elizabeth Rush, a member of a well-known eld Philadelphia family.
