Miss Loretta Hoag, Actress, Handles Pugilistic Destinies of Brother—Broadway Show for Tonight

Miss Hoag enjoys the singular distinction of being the only sister-manager of a boxer in New York city at the various local clubs.

Miss Hoag's advent into the boxing world came about upon the advice of Jess Willard, Tom Jones and Billy McCarthy. It seems that Miss Hoag, who is an actress, was playing out West at the time Jess Willard was first matched with Jack Johnson. The battleground for the bout was set for Juarez, Mex. Jack Curley, who was promoting the big bout, signed Willard up to give exhibition bouts at the various local clubs.

Miss Hoag informed Willard that she had a brother who was a boxer, and asked the big cowboy's advice about obtaining a proper manager for her brother. Curley, Johnson, McCarthy and Willard gave her many pointers about what constituted a good manager. Willard, whereupon turned to Miss Hoag and said: "Why not handle him yourself, Miss Hoag?" "Splendid idea," chimed in both Jones and McCarthy. From that moment Miss Hoag became the first lady-manager of a boxer in the world.

Here he was interrupted by the Magistrate, who asked him to postpone the Shakespearean outburst.

"Your honor, my name is John Kennedy, and I am 50 years old," said the man. "I am a son of old Broadway. I was with Denham Thompson in 'The Old Homestead,' and lately, in New York, I made \$100 a week in the 'movies.'"

He added that he had been a priest, but would not say where. He was sent to the House of Correction for three months, and will be examined as to his sanity.

Philadelphia Members of National Security League Favor President's Desire for Army of 300,000

GEN. GILMORE AS CHIEF

Philadelphia members of the National Security League expressed great satisfaction on learning that President Wilson favored the establishment of an army of 300,000 men. Incidentally, it became known that Philadelphia may soon organize a camp for the training of citizens in the manual of arms and in soldiering tactics. Informal requests have been made to Adjutant General J. Campbell Gilmore, retired, of the N. G. P., suggesting that the establishment of such a camp would meet with the
