san Francisco, Sept. 3.—Governor Brumbaugh, of Pennsylvania, has washed his hands of the Philadelphia mayoralty deal. Asked to comment on the "harmony" on Thomas B. Smith, he replied. "That is purely a local election. I do not care to express an opinion regarding any of the candidates. It is a matter for the voters of Philadelphia to decide."

Coupled with the revolt and disgust that swept the ranks of Republican Orworkers as the result of the ithdrawal of Congressman William S. Vare from the mayoralty race and the carefully staged indorsement of Public ervice Commissioner Thomas B. Smith. plation as to the terms of the "deal" was general in political circles today.

"What will the Vares get out of it," was the question Vare followers in South Phildelphia asked. They had been eager for a fight, and they felt that their prestige was lost when Congressman Vare publicly surrendered to Penrose and McNichol at historic meeting at the Republican Committee rooms yesterday after-

One paragraph in Vare's statement which he read to the committee gave rise to many rumors in political circles today. The paragraph follows:

"In four years, by my renewed forts in Washington, I will carriesly try to convince even those who are not now supporting me that I am worthy of their support. A united Republican party and a united city is the end toward which all of us should work." The rumors were widespread to the effect that Vare had been bought off by promises from Penrose and McNichol that they would support him for Mayor four years hence.

ANOTHER HURRICANE HEADED FOR THE GULF COAST

Travels 100 Miles an Hour-Galveston Residents Prepare to Flee

GALVESTON, Tex., Sept 3.—A report reached here this afternoon that another West Indian hurricane is on its way toward the Guly coast, and scores of persons are preparing to leave Gulveston. The storm is 500 miles from Galveston and traveling over the same course followed by the hurricane of nearly three weeks ago, was said to be hlowing at the rate of 100 miles an hour.

Hurricane signals work run up this afternoon all along the Gulf. The storm, unless it changes its course, is expected to strike the coast some time before Sunday.

WASHINGTON, Espt. 1.—The indications are now that the 100 mile gale flow aweeping across the Gulf of Mexico from the West Indies will not reach as far as Galyeston. It was stated at the Westher Bursau here this afternoon. The gale is declared to be coming due north and is expected to strike the Gulf countrast of New Orieans. Shipping in the gulf has been warred.

GRODNO FALLS; PETROGRAD IS **NOW MENACED**

Czar Loses Last Important Stronghold on Second Line of Defense

VILNA NEXT OBJECTIVE

Captured City Railway Centre Dominating Lines to Capital

BERLIN, Sept 3. Field Marshal von Hindenburg's army has captured Grodno, the last fort in the Czar's second line of defense held by the

Official announcement of the capture of the great Russian fortress is made in today's report from the General Staff.
German troops, it states, rapidly forced the passage of the Niemen River after capturing the Russian forts. There was fighting in the streets of Grodno. The city is now in the hands of the Germans.

The city of Gradno with its circle of The city of Grodno, with its circle of forts, is one of the most important aironsholds in western Russia, it is only 80 miles southwest of Vilna, a strategic point commanding the rallways to Petrograd, and about 50 miles from the east Prussian frontier. The rallway connecting Warsaw and Petrograd passes through Grodno, and, therefore, the German victory is of tremendous importance in that it may further open the way for a great German drive on the Czar's capi-

The town is the capital of the Province of Grodno, in Lithuania, bordering on Poland, one of the most important dia-tricts of Russia. The population is about 50,000, more than one-half being Jews. The manufactures include war munitions, tobacco, seep and candles. Grodno is on the right bank of the Niemen and the Rivers Bug and Narew also flow through the province, which has an area of 14,000 square miles.

GERMAN OFFICIAL REPORT,

The General Staff's report follows: "Field Marshall von Hindenburg's army conquered Grodno after rapidly forcing the passage of the Niemen and fighting is the streets.

"German troops have reached the Nie between Augustowo channel and locz. The bridgehead at Lenne-Swistocz. The oringenesia at Lenne-wardene was stormed by our cavalry.

"Northwest and west of Vina the Rus-sians tried to oppose our advance. Their efforts failed, the Russians suffering extraordinary losses. Southeast of Merecz the Russians were also thrown back.
"The troops of General von Gallwitz broke the enemy's resistance on the road between Alekszyce and Swislocz.
"The army of Field Marshal von Hin-

denburg captured more than 2000 Russian prisoners and took one cannon and 18 machine guns.
"Prince Leopold of Bavaria's army continues its battle north of Prushany.
"Field Marshal von Mackensen's army is pursuing the Russians through the Jarolda near Silneka, Bereza and Karaxieke, as well as the district of Antopol, east of Kobrin. Austre-Hungarian treeps
