

RAILS WERE AGAIN THE MARKET LEADERS

Further Large Gain Shown by Coal, Bank Clearings for the Week

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—The market in the short session today was virtually a holiday affair. There was very little activity for any kind of securities, the general inclination being to hold over the holiday, no amount of stocks. While the market was narrow they were very active and higher levels. The most active securities in the early dealing were American Steel, Colorado Fuel and Iron, and United States Steel, but the iron and steel shares were not wide, and reference to Colorado Fuel and Iron was said to be the annual report, which is expected to be issued in the first half of the year.

NEW YORK BANK STATEMENT

Reserves Rose Over Fifteen Millions. Loans Also Larger. NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—The average reserve of the clearing house banks rose \$15,250,000 this week. Loans expanded \$18,900,000, and average deposits increased \$18,900,000. The actual figures did not show the total increase of \$25,650,000, with net deposits of \$25,710,000 and time deposits of \$12,940,000. The aggregate reserve was \$1,210,000,000.

ANOTHER LEAP IN CLEARINGS

Heavy Export Sales of Oats and Spring Wheat—Pressure at Liverpool

CHICAGO, Sept. 4.—With the shorts apparently covered the market was left in no position to withstand heavy selling, which took place at the opening today, and prices broke generally from 1/4 to 1/2 when compared with closing quotations of yesterday. Millers were said to be buying spring wheat at Minneapolis on the decline. Bears predicted that cash premiums will be reduced in a week or ten days, and prices will be much lower.
