Five months ago the Evening Ledger's reviewer wrote: 'Three hours of beauty and emotion; the finest staging of battle handling of nature and man in the large; the biggest thrill on Broadway—that is the monster photoplay, "The Birth of a Nation.'" The only modification he cares

to make after seeing Griffith's spectacle brought to the Forrest is to change Broadway to Broad street. Outside such mmary this buge entertainment of ndred satisfactions leaves him wondering what on earth to say first. It has

There is the scenario, first of all. With Frank Woods aid Mr. Griffith has begun-by the miracle of making Thomas Dixon plausible. More than that, he has built on the foundation of the rhetorical "Clansman" and some Northern as puerile a three-hour narrative that moves with admirable sequence to exciting and affecting climaxes. Finally, he has fused the drama of nations with the drama of individuals. He has thro great vistas of the Civil War before as a background to the adventures of his people and made the two units to aid

each other. The one thing that impresses most is undoubtedly the mighty perfection of the battle scenes. The sweep and the detail, the immensity of the action and perfection of each part, make you marvel at the imagination and the labor that must have been behind their conception and rehearsal. Yet Griffith's skill in the de-velopment of the war scenes as a whole is far mare remarkable. By progressing from rushing guerrilla skirmishes at Piedmont to the devastating descent of Sherman on Atlanta, and finally to the rebel charges and defeat on the cannon-swept plains of Petersburg, Griffith aweeps his audience to a climax of battle

While the first part of the picture is war in the large, impressive and moving in the grander sense, the second is made melodramatic and exciting by the rides of the KuKlux Klan to save various whites from the perils of Reconstruction. There Griffith uses every ounce of the screen's power to fling out rapid, racing action. And to this melodrama he adds some beautiful, striking views of the white riders assembling in broad fields. charging down long, still roads, curving over hills at sunrise. These are only a few examples of the admirable wedding of excitement and beauty which Griffith so sagely recognizes as the photoplay's

special province. There are a dozen other perfections. To name only one example of one of these, the photography picks out the difference of atmospheric light between a northern town and the leaf-flecked warmness of South Carolina. Music and some skilful off-stage sounds add a thrill, sometimes of recollection, sometimes of reality. The or recollection, sometimes of reality. Philadelphia's audiences have, soften, been the goat in pressesson pieces; in this farce by A. Seymour Brown and Harry Lewis, revised and staged by Otto Hauerbach, Philadelphia was not even the dog, Atlantic City having agreeably enough served as such.

Theatrical meteorologists, who have assisted in opening "the season" in past years, knew that Saturday would turn hot and humid before 8 o'clock p. m. Their expectation was not unrewarded. The inevitable occurred. The result was to reduce sharp analysis of "Brot Masons" and to accept its good po at perhaps a higher entertainment value than they deserved. It had more than a modicum of these good points, and it "went" swiftly and smoothly, thanks to practice on the Boardwalk crowds. Re-cording the verdict of the large audience, "Brother Masons" is an early season success, for its situations and lines set laugh waves into continual vibration and relegated thoughts of thermometer and barometer into obliviacence.

Why be critical? Why be captious?
Why say the situations merely dust off the familiar expedients of farce? Why declare that the humor of the dialogue does not proceed essentially from character or plot, but at its most humorous personality, "gets" a plentitude of laughs

might be lifted aimpst without oftence for a sidewalk patter turn before a drop by a pair of hesty-lunged vaudevillians? Why delve into the past to recall that the Masonic motif was used more defily and plausibly by Leo Ditrichstein? To do no would be merely to post one's self has a dry-as-dust theatrical archeologist; worse-a highbrow critic, concerned with the unities and James Huneker's theory of comedy.

The audience has spoken. Hather, it is laughed and applauded. Despite its verdict, "only an observer" in the play-houses for a decade may casually state that some time his watchful waiting will be rewarded in a farce that has an unhackneyed basis and altuations that are amusing, surprising and believable. amusing, surprising and believable. "Brother Masons" has two such episodes, the smashing climax of act I and the pinochle game in act III.

pinochie game in act III.

Some day, too, a playwright will reserve his best, his most unexpected material for the denouement of his farce. The co-authors of "Brother Masons" have not cone so, and the "reviser" frankly named on the program has not reorganized and reordered the situations. Doubtless the collaborators thought the result of their labors was Junny enough. Well, it has lots of laughs.

It is difficult to discover from the farea whether it was "built up" on a "catchy" title, or whether the title was an afterthousht, and the Masonic touches interpolated to carry it.

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
