Fred and Florence, aged 7 and 4, respectively, all of whom crawled down the stairs and to the street in safety, clad only in night

It was then remembered that Otto Buck, another employe of the bakery, was asseep on the third floor of the building, and Bosch once more made his way through the smoke, awakening and res-

Leonard Walters, whose home is at 1515 East Susquehanna avenue, was finally obliged to leave his work in the basement when firemen ripped open the chimney to his oven. The damage done by the blaze is estimated at \$1000.


