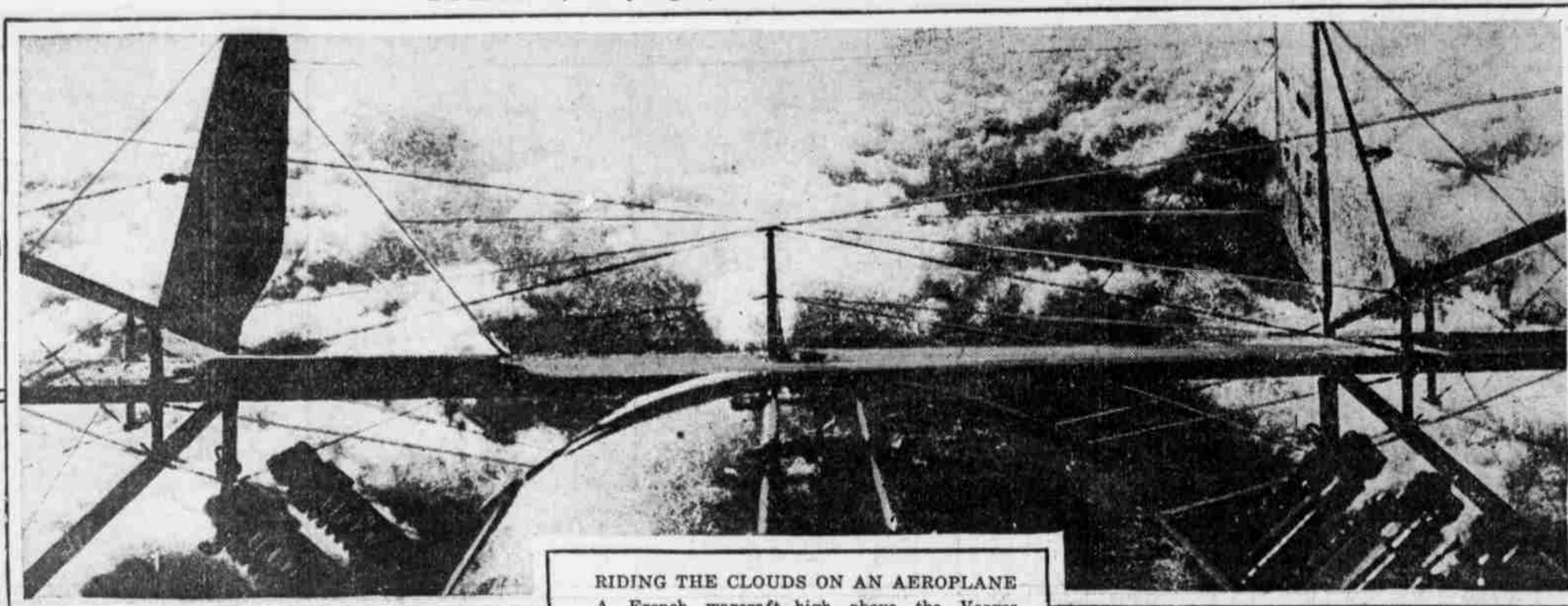




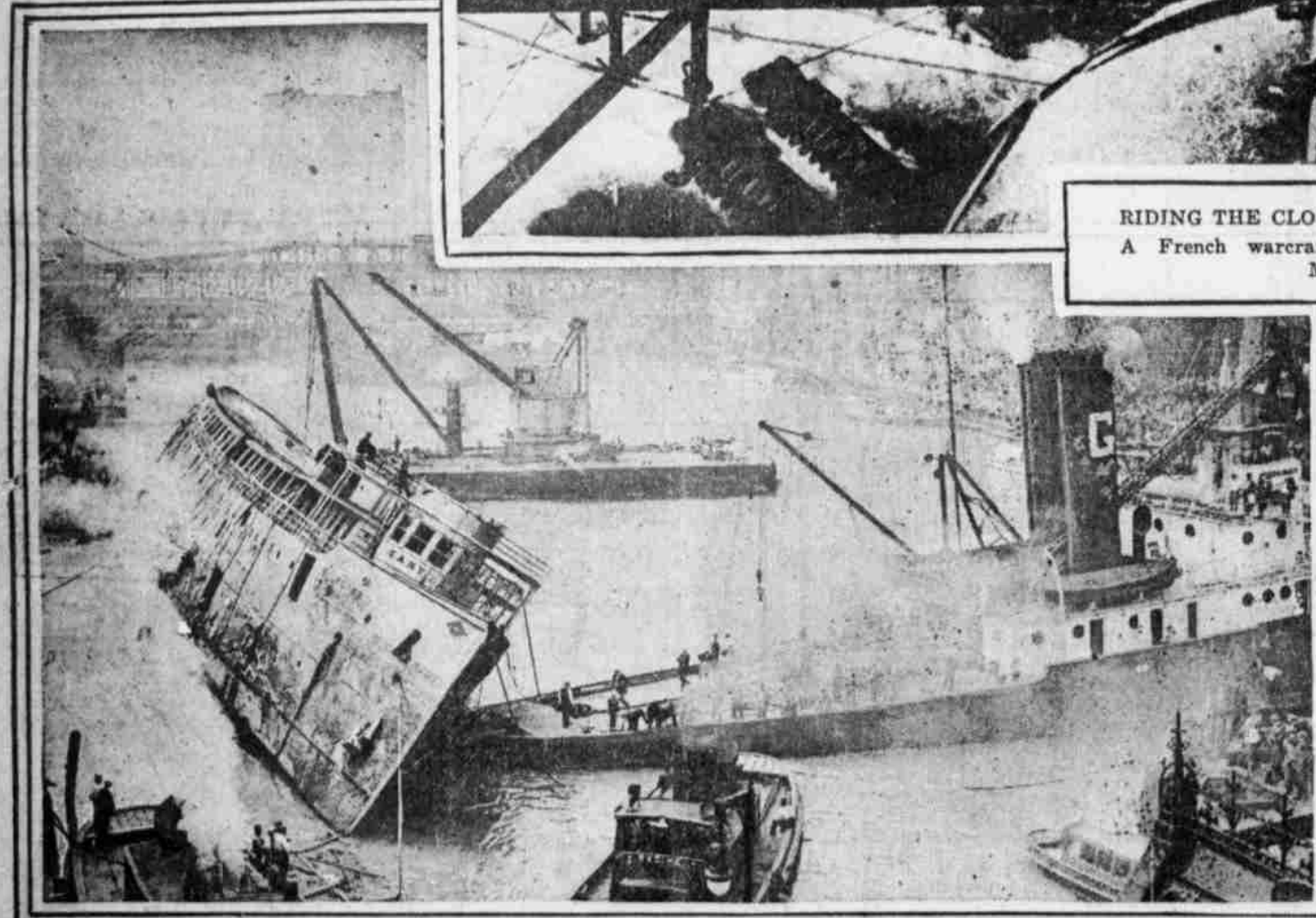

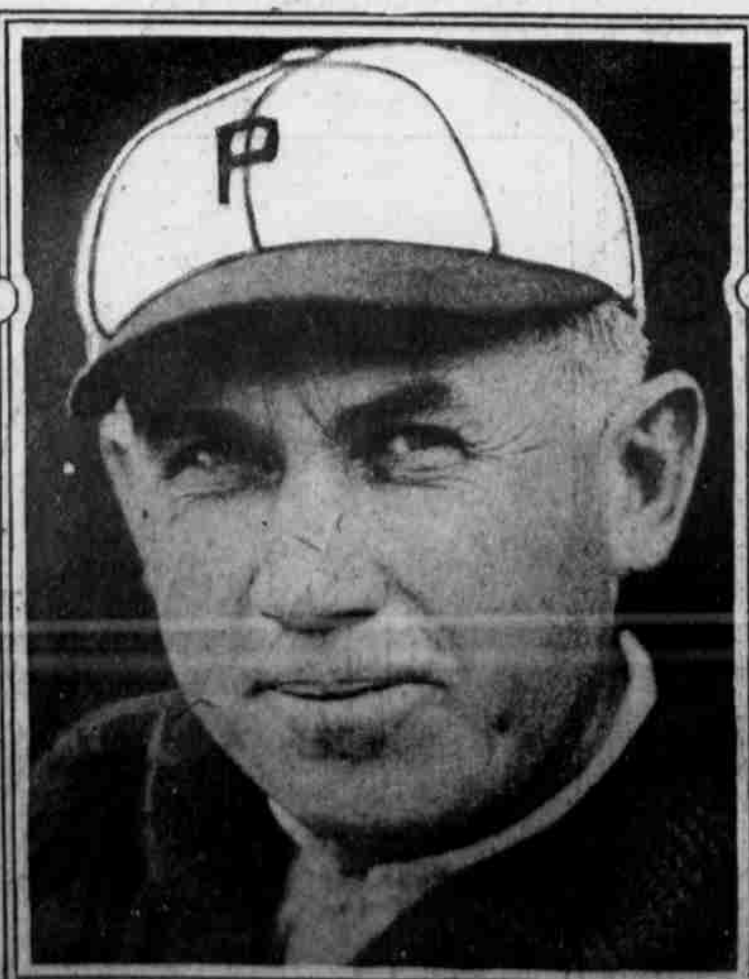
RIDING THE CLOUDS ON AN AEROPLANE
 A French warcraft high above the Vosges Mountains.



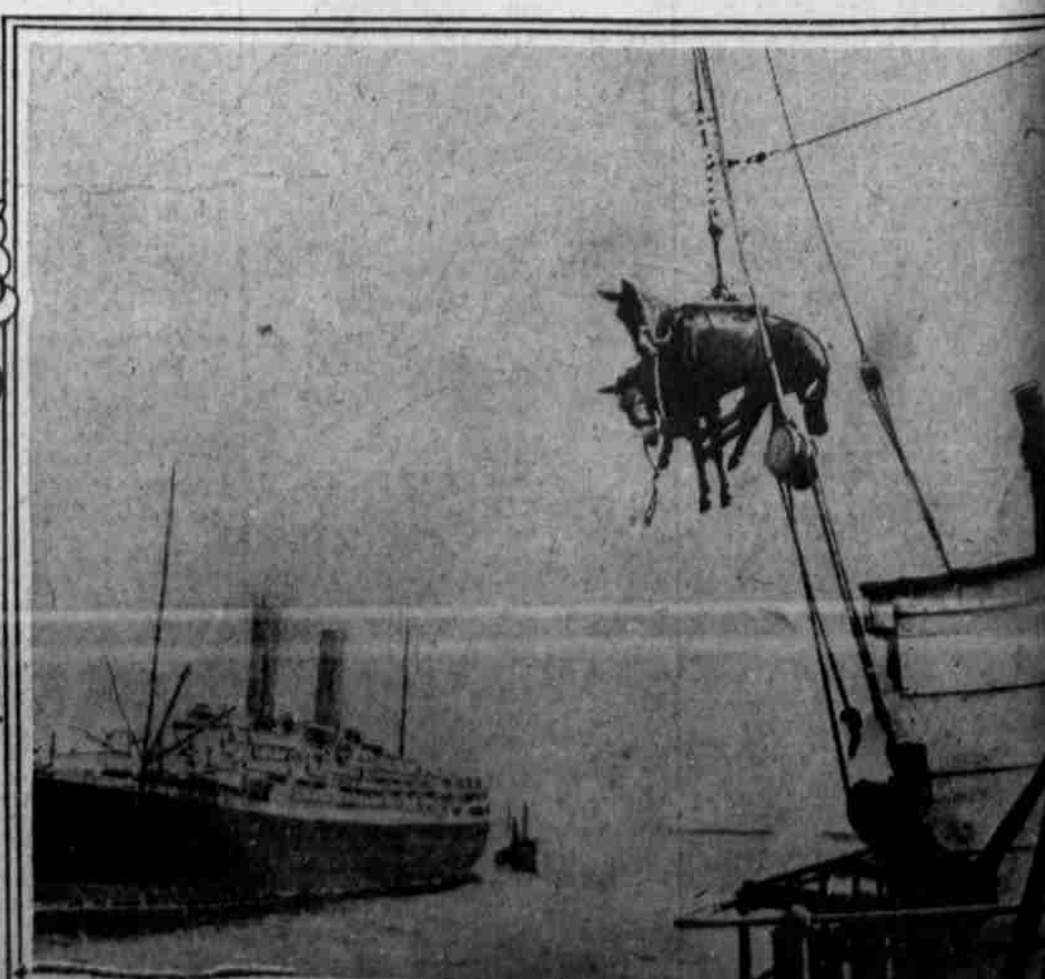
