U. S. NEUTRALITY LAWS MORE CLOSELY OBSERVED

Violations Reduced to Minimum Because of Strict Vigilance

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17 .- The work of the neutrality squads which have been organized by the customs division in various seaports of the United States has been so effective that virtually all efforts at overt violations of American neutrality in connection with shipping have ceased, according to Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Peters, in charge of the neutrality business at the ports.

Mr. Peters said today that, while cases of violations of neutrality occurred frequently at seaport cities during the first HE FOUND NEW LAND six months of the European war, there has not been a case now for several weeks. Would-be violators of American neutrality laws and regulations have be-come discouraged, he says.
