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REDS SHUT OUT PHILLIES, 2-0; MACKS LOSE ONE, TIE IN LAST

WEDGE DRIVEN INTO SLAV LINE BY HINDENBURG

Separates Forces Defending Dvinsk From Defenders of Vilna

GERMANS TAKE WIDSY
Field Marshal von Hindenburg has driven a wedge between the Russian troops defending Dvinsk and those defending Vilna.

GERMANS ADVANCING.
In addition to announcing that Widzy has been taken, today's report from the General Staff states that other forces of von Hindenburg, together with troops of Field Marshal Prince Leopold, of Bavaria, have crossed the Schtchara River, a tributary of the Niemen, just to the eastward of which runs the main railway from Vilna to Rovno.

SEE-SAW BATTLE RAGING ON WHOLE RUSSIAN LINE
What may be characterized as a see-saw battle is raging from Riga to Volhynia. The Slavs are on the offensive at certain sectors, particularly in the south. The Teuton advance drives on in the East Lithuanian and Dvinsk fields.

WOMAN SAYS SHE IS THE WIDOW OF EDWARD BROMLEY

Mysterious Mourner at Clubman's Funeral Is Mrs. Caroline Karst

ASKS SHARE OF ESTATE
The mystery of the woman who created a scene at the funeral of the late Edward Bromley, widely known and wealthy manufacturer and clubman, and then abruptly halted proceedings when his will was offered for probate, with the demand for a widow's share in the \$1,000,000 estate, has been cleared up through her attorney.

WANTS "WIDOW'S SHARE."
Through her attorney, Mrs. Karst will sue into the Orphans' Court and ask that the widow's share of the estate be given her.

Congressman Asks Defense of Candidates, Attacks on Independents and Plea for 1916 as Program
TALK OF RELIGIOUS WORK
The Republican Organization plan of campaign this fall, as outlined this afternoon by Senator James P. McInnis, is to hold a meeting of the Republican City Committee, will be along the following lines:

First. Defense of the Organization candidates.
Second. Attacks upon the independent candidates.
Third. The plea that an Organization victory in Philadelphia this fall will be the forerunner of a national Republican victory in 1916.

The influence, the Stone Men's Club is exerting in this campaign was brought up by Senator James P. McInnis. He did not mention the Stone Men's Club by name, but discussed the part religious influences are having in the fight against the Organization.

"BACK DOOR METHODS" SAYS McINNIS
"An attempt is being made to fight us by 'back door' methods," said Senator McInnis. "It will never succeed, though. It has been suddenly discovered that you cannot get us by the back door. You have to come in the front door."

SHIPS SAFE FROM HURRICANE
British Craft Ariadne Docks Here With Her Deck Stripped
The British steamship Ariadne, her decks stripped of virtually all equipment and the skylights over the engine room broken by a monster sea, docked at the Pennsylvania Docks Company wharf this afternoon following a perilous voyage to this city from Havana, Spain.

On September 12 the captain of the vessel, George Webber, noticed the barometer falling rapidly. It finally reached 29.8, when a gale began to blow which finally developed into a hurricane with a 50-mile-an-hour velocity. All hands were called, the officers were lashed to their posts on the bridge, and the ship "heaved" for 36 hours, weathering the gale, although being badly damaged. The Ariadne carries a cargo of copper ore.

U. S. WILL PREVENT PASSPORT FRAUD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The United States will standardize its passports to prevent their fraudulent use as recently charged by the Germans and other European belligerents. Richard W. Flournoy, Jr., head of the Citizenship Bureau of the State Department, went to New York this afternoon to sail on a tour of the European capitals as a preliminary step in this move.
