## THE VARDON STANCE IN GOLF PERMITS OF POWERFUL STROKE

Exact Position of Toes, Together With Attitude of Body for Best Shot, Explained by

Noted Analyst

### By JOHN ALBERT SCOTT

In done by standing in a way which will permit the delivering of the most power-ful stroke possible, and at the same time keep the club head in the right track to make the ball travel in the direction we want it to go.

This is called the "stance," a Scotch word meaning stand, one of the many Scotch words which have become recognized golfing terms.

To illustrate the correct stance for the swing which will be described, photo-graphs of Vardon and Braid have been used, showing them "addressing" the ball preparatory to driving.

The lines on the ground were placed after they had assumed the stance, the one across and in front of the feet indi-cating the one of play, i. e., the fight of the ball—the one from the ball passing between the feet and crossing the first at an exact angle, shows how much the ball is to the right and left of the feet. These lines show the exact relation of the feet to the line of play and the ball,

very important elements to what follows: The terms "open stance," square stance," etc., will not be used. I will simply submit the photographs and try and tell why this stance is used.

The right toe touches the line across the feet and the left toe is about three inches back of it. The right foot is about three inches back of it. The right foot is almost at a right angle to the line, slightly back of an exact right angle. The left too is pointing toward the hole at an an-gle of about 45 degrees. It is not a matter of extrems importance, as it will vary with the height of the player and the length of the club shaft, but as a matter of interest I will say that the distance


