The Rev. Horace F. Fuller, rector of the Trinity Episcopal Church, Church lane and Oxford road, died late yesterday at his home, Tabor road and Asylum pike, Olney, of heart trouble,

He graduated from the Philadelphia Divinity School in 1804.
