Clothing Treated With American Dyes May Not Withstand Attacks of Jupiter Pluvius

When you buy that new autumn suit a week or so from now be sure to choose one that is plain in color. If you don't you may resemble a zebra after the first officials of the National Association of Clothiers say that it will be a very short time, indeed, before the lack of coal tar dyestuffs will necessitate keeping the cloths colored with American dyes away
