

Eafety, will lead the fight of the inde- 50 Others Hurt When Crowded Car Drops With Street Into New Subway-Explosion May Have Loosened Underpinning

> NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—While hundreds of rescuers are searching for more victims of the cave-in disaster here today. ALICE FIRMIN, contusions, four official investigations are being vigorously pureued Six persons were crushed to death when a street car plunged to feet into the new subway being constructed in 7th avenue as a block and a helf of the street surface collapsed. PORTER RESIGNS PLACE IN CABINET TO BEGIN FIGHT

Independents' Mayoralty Candidate Asks Mayor to Release Him

MATTER OF PRINCIPLE

George D. Porter, independent mayoralty nominee, handed his resignation as Director of the Department of Public Safety to Mayor Blankenburg shortly mediate leadership of the fight against the election of Thomas B. Smith, the Organization candidate for Mayor. The resignation does not go into effect until 6 o'clock this afternoon, in order to allow the Director to sign several important contracts.

Director Porter's resignation follows: To the Hon. Rudolph Blankenburg. Mayor of Philadelphia:

Dear Sir-After nearly four years of personal and official relations with you, it is extremely difficult and painful for me to ask you to permit me to sever the official relations. In doing so allow me to express my strong sense of appreciation for the complete confidence which you have always manifested in my conduct as head of the important department which you placed in my charge in De-cember, 1911, and for the delightful character of our personal association.

As you are aware, however, at the primary election yesterday the call was extended to me to stand as the representative of good government in the coming mayoralty election. This is a call which I cannot refuse, and as it call which I cannot refuse, and as it would be manifestly improper that a candidate for the office of mayor should occupy the position of Director of the Department of Public Safety, I am constrained to ask your acceptance of my resignation, to take effect at the close of business today.
