









# ANTHONY COMSTOCK, NOTED VICE CRUSADER, DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Ian Known All Over World as Guardian of Morality Passes Away After Short Illness

#### VORRY AND WORK CAUSE

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.-Anthony Comck, secretary of the Society for the ppression of Vice, known the world er through the controversies following s crusades against questionable and incent books, pictures and plays, died at night, at the age of 71 years, after illness of 10 days, which ended in

ork and overexcitement resulting from is fight to retain his position as postal spector, which he had held since his dintment by President Grant in 1873 d from his successful efforts to convict illiam Sanger of having violated the minal code in giving away a copy of "Family Limitation," a booklet written by Mrs. Margaret Sanger.

On September 10 Mr. Comstock took a heated part in the court proceedings in the Sanger case, which ended after a fine of \$150 had been imposed on Sanger, in hooting and shouting by Alexander Berkman, Elizabeth Gurley Flynn and others, chiefly anarchists. Mr. Comstock, who in his excitement had talked without permission of the Court, was allowed to apeak before the close of the trial, and he shouted that he had been told tha he would be shot unless he dropped the prosecution of the case. The day after this scene in court Mr. Comstock was it of an intermittent fever, which finall, caused pneumonia.

WORRIED OVER HOLDING POSITIO Great worry was caused Mr. Comstoce in June by repeated reports from Wash ington that he was to be relieved of his position as postal inspector and other stories that he might be ousted because of the many antagonisms he had cause from his position as secretary of th Society for the Suppression of Vice, M. Comstock charged that there was a conspiracy at the Federal Building in this city to procure his dismissal, and ap-pealed directly to Washington. In July, after he had received assurances that he would be retained, he said:

"The right must prevail. I knew all along the plans of the miserable schemers

plotting to oust me would fail."

While few persons have attempted to criticise Mr. Comstock for his efforts to suppress books and pictures manifestly intended to be sold chiefly for their licentious character, he had been the cen-tre of controversy during most of the 43 years of his career as a crusader because of the differences of opinion over what constituted the dividing line between indecency and art. The fact that blanks occur in the translated pages of Zola, of Boccaccio and of many modern and ancient classics is due to Mr. Comstock. He protested against the appearance of many plays here, notably "Mrs. Warren's Profession." George Bernard Shaw was added to the long line of humorists and satirists who have exercised their talents on the noted secretary of the Society for the Suppression of Vice.

ACTIVITY CALLED "ADVERTISING. Where public opinion and the courts held that Mr. Comstock had been wrong in finding evil in what purported to be art, the controversy was the finest advertising in the world. "September Morn" is the most recent instance. In May, 1913, Mr. Comstock threatened to arrest a local art dealer who had the original by Paul Chabas on exhibition. The arrest was never made, but the public was soon given a chance to decide lie was soon given a chance to decide whether "September Morn" was art or not, because some hundreds of thousands of lithographic reproductions were in a few weeks on sale in stores in every part of the United States.

The hard work which Mr. Comstock did, day in and day out, attracted less attention, because there was no chance to ridicule it. Every year, with the help of his staff and the police, he conficated tons of printed matter which the owners were in no position to defend.

Up to 1914 Mr. Comstock had caused the of 3607 persons, of which 2740 either pleaded guilty or were convicted. In these cases fines were imposed to the extent of \$237,134.30 and imprisonment to the length of \$65 years, Il months and 20 days. Several hundred arrests and several thousand dollars in fines were added in 1814 and 1816. in 1914 and 1916.

Conduits' Lease to Lighting Company

Director Cooke, of the Department of Company to the Philadelphia Electric Company. The city's legal representatives will be present at the meeting at Harrisburg tomorrow, at which an effort will be made to have the Public Service Commission ratify the lease.

The city authorities, with no desire to harass the public service companies, but with a view to preventing any action that might stiffle competition, will oppose the combine of underground wires from a number of standpoints. After a careful perusal of the agreement between the utility concerns, the officials will base their opposition on the wide general ground that such an agreement would be against public policy. The fact that Councils or the Mayor were not consulted before the plan to stifle future competition was agreed upon is an additional ground for the interference planned by the city.

The lease for which ratification is sought gives the Electric Company the right to a long-term lease and later the right to purchase all conduit space used. The Keystone Company has 12,264,897 duct feet in its conduits that cover about 335 miles of city streets Director Cooke is of the opinion that such a lease would give the Electric Company such an advantage over all possible competitors as to act as an agreement in the restraint of business.
