Ryan ran ahead of Wessel in the 28th Ward. Thomas B. Smith's home ward. He received 1831 votes in that ward to 847 for Wessel. Ryan's largest majority was received in the 18th, where 1502 votes were cast for him, as against 369 for Wessel.

Returns from 35 wards complete, give Ryan 29,601 and Wessel 44,527. All of the candidates who had the sup-port of the Organization for the other Judgeships were nominated without much

opposition.

Judging from the returns available late today, it appears that Orlady, Hend and Williams received a majority of the votes cast for the Superses Court candidates, and will have no opposition at the general election in November, Returns from throughout the State may change this, however, as William D. Wallace, of Lawrence County.

AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Son of the Late William T. Tilden a Victim of Pneumonia

Herbert M. Tilden, a son of the late William T. Tilden, and formerly widely known as an expert tennis player, died suddenly of pneumonia at his home on McKean avenue, Germantown, this morn-

suddenly of pneumonia at his home on McKean avenue, Germantown, this morning.

Mr. Tilden, who was 29 years old, was taken with a severe cold on Friday, and, although it developed into pneumonia Sunday, no great anxiety was feit by his family over his condition. The end came unexpectedly. His death follows closely on that of his father, which occurred July 29.

Mr. Tilden was assistant secretary and treasurer of the William T. Tilden Company, hair and wool merchants, with offices at 254 North Front street. Several years ago he held the Fennayivania State tennis doubles championship and the same title in Delaware. More recently he has been less active in the sport.

Mr. Tilden leaves a widow, who was before her matriage Miss Hazel Megarges, and two children, Mriam Sellina and William T. Tilden, M., aged 4 and 2 years, respectively. His brother, William T. Tilden, 2d. is also well known as a tennis player.

Up to the time of his last liness Mr. Tilden was an active tennis player. In 1862, partnered by Alexander D. Thayer, he won the intercollegiate lawn tennis doubles championship, and in recent years H. M. Tilden and his younger bruther, W. T. Tilden, 2d. have formed a doubles team that has met with more than the usual amount of success.

The younger Tilden is one of the best tennis players in this section of the country, and to his brother Herbert he is indebted for much of his knowledge of the game.
