# HORSE THROWER WHILE CROWDS GASP AT BRYN MAWR SHOW

BRYN MAWR, Pa., Sept. 28.—An excellent program of widely varied events attracted a crowd of horse lovers to the Bryn Mawr Horse Show today. The events were of a sufficiently varied character to interest every kind and condition of horse lover, from pony classes for children to polo and hunter classes.

The weather gods favored the exhibition again today and furnished the clearest of weather. The air was cool to the point of snappiness, however, and made a place in the sun very much to be desired. The more placid seats on the turf opposite the grandstand appealed, therefore, to the spectators and the more exclusive boxes were almost deserted. It was a vantage place, anyway, for the terrace was the center point of observation today. Classes were judged on the polo field and it is there the tent is pitched in which are shown the hounds.

A slight thrill came to the spectators today when Master Beck, one of W. Hinkle Smith's entries in a class for green hunters, grew obstreperous, reared and fell, throwing his rider, Jimmie Higgins, a groom; neither was hurt, but the mount was ruled out.
