SUFFRAGISTS DEFY GERMANTOWN AGENT

He Says They Must Remove Big Streamer From Moorings. but They Refuse

Germantown suffragists are preparing to fight to the last ditch to keep their big streamer, which stretches across the stream at Germantown and Chelten avenues, and which says to the world, "Vote for Woman Suffrage, November 2," from being cut from its moorings. It may be difficult to fight to the last ditch to keep the properly moored, but the more anything properly moored, but the more difficult it may be the more the suffragists will welcame the combat.

The women have won the first round gainst Charles Schaefer, agent for the vernon Building, who demanded that the big streamer be removed yesterday by noon or elsc — but, whatever he said. noon or else — but, what the streamer still streams,

It was this way. On Saturday, September 15, the Woman Suffrage organization of the 15th legislative district, with headquarters at 50 West Chelton avenue, raised the atreamer, with speeches and songs and the playing of loud instru-

One and of it was hitched to the thiristory of the Postoffice Building, occupied by C. Jacoby's printing establishment and the other end to a third-story windowsill of the Germantown Business College, which rents quarters in the Vernon Building and is conducted by Charles R. Hansel. The suffragists had the congent of Jacoby, Hansel and the police, all of whom evidently are for suffrage.

Schaefer suddenly announced that the Schaefer suddenly announced that the streamer must come down. He said the rope was turging at the window in the Vernon Building and might hurt it. Miss Grace Hillis, secretary for the suffragista, went to Hansel, who said he had the right to hang out streamers and that the agent could not deprive him of it. Schnefer said if it was not down by noon

Schnefer said if it was not down by noon he would have the rope cut.

Both sides went to the police station and Sergeant Kiker went around to patch up the breach. He retired in dismay, saying they would have to fight it out in court. Schnefer did not carry out his threat, and the women say that Hansel and Jacoby will support them to the last ditch. They think there is "politics" behind the agent's move, although by some hind the agent's move, although by some oversight the Vernon Building was reently painted suffrage yellow.

Oysters and bacon—Wrap three dozen

Oysters and bacon-Wrap three dozen coysters in a very thin slice of breakfast bacon, Lay on a brotler over a baiding pan in a hot oven. Remove when the ba-com is brown. Each must be fastered with a wooden toothpick. Serve with minced parsley and drawn butter, as given above, or the following Sauce

Sauce Piquant-Chop two onlone very fine. Smother in a tablespoonful of but-ter. When well cooked, without burning, add one tablespoonful of consomme, or water. Add two cloves of garile, minced very fine, season to taste with hot pep per. Take two pickles about two inche in length, and cut into thin slices of about a quarter of an inch in thickness. Put this into the sauce, with a teaspor of strong vinegar, and let the whole for about five minutes. This is for about five minutes. This is very good when served with cold boiled meats. 
