

SUFFRAGISTS DEFY GERMANTOWN AGENT

He Says They Must Remove Big Steamer From Moorings, but They Refuse

Germantown suffragists are preparing to fight to the last ditch to keep their big steamer, which stretches across the street at Germantown and Chelton avenues, and which says to the world, "Vote for Woman Suffrage, November 2," from being cut from its moorings. It may be difficult to fight to the last ditch to keep anything properly moored, but the more difficult it may be the more the suffragists will welcome the combat.

The women have won the first round against Charles Schaefer, agent for the Vermon Building, who demanded that the big steamer be removed yesterday by noon or else—but, whatever he said, the steamer still remains.

It was this way. On Saturday, September 18, the Woman Suffrage organization of the 15th legislative district, with headquarters at 50 West Chelton avenue, raised the steamer, with speeches and songs and the playing of loud instruments.

One end of it was hitched to the third-story of the Postoffice Building, occupied by C. Jacoby's printing establishment, and the other end to a third-story window of the Germantown Business College, which rents quarters in the Vermon Building and is conducted by Charles R. Hansel. The suffragists had the consent of Jacoby, Hansel and the police, all of whom evidently are for suffrage.

Schaefer suddenly announced that the steamer must come down. He said the rope was tugging at the last ditch to keep it from being cut from its moorings, and might hurt it. Miss Grace Hillis, secretary for the suffragists, went to Hansel, who said he had the right to hang out streamers and that the agent could not deprive him of it. Schaefer said if it was not down by noon he would have the rope cut.

Both sides went to the police station and Sergeant Kiker went around to patch the breach. He retired in dismay, saying they would have to fight it out in court. Schaefer did not carry out his threat, and the women say that Hansel and Jacoby will support them to the last ditch. They think there is "politics" behind the agent's move, although by some oversight the Vermon Building was recently painted suffrage yellow.

Alleged Flimflammers Held
Two youths, alleged flimflammers, who were captured after a chase over rooftops, in which shots were fired, were held to \$500 bail each for their trial by Magistrate MacFarland, of the 24 and Christian streets station. They are Rocco Ferro, 735 Montrose street, and Frank Di Lemmo, 529 Kater street. Their victim, Annunzio Coradetto, 417 Pine street, Camden, accused them of robbing him of \$25 by giving him counterfeit money in a handkerchief as change.

White Bob separated the negro from the coal with some difficulty and took him to the East Girard avenue station. Black Bob didn't seem to have any definite destination and said he was "jia driftin'." He made no objection to "driftin'" northwesterly, and will cast anchor in the port of Holmesburg for three months.

PHILADELPHIA'S OYSTERS BEST IN THE COUNTRY

Timely Hints From Skilled Creole Cooks on the Newest and Best Ways of Preparing Them for the Table

THIS oyster season is on. Philadelphia has reason to be proud of her oysters, for she gets the best of the market, straight from the sparkling waters of the Chesapeake Bay.

There are many attractive ways of preparing oysters, and cooks who make a specialty of their skill in this line will be glad to know that the Evening Ledger has arranged with the New Orleans Times-Picayune for publication, in the woman's page, of some old Creole recipes for oyster delicacies.

New Orleans is world famous for its recipes, for here may be found the choicest of the French, Spanish and Creole cooking. The residents have preserved these old recipes for generations. They have been handed down with as much care as the most precious heirlooms. The value of such a collection is easily appreciated, and readers of the woman's page will not be sorry if they cut out each day's series, and paste them in the back of their cook books for future reference.

The most famous dishes of our Southern cooks are included in the collection, and they cannot be had from any other source.

The following oyster dishes will prove interesting for an informal spread:
Oyster on Brochettes—Take five sliced breakfast bacon and cut into thin slices about the size of the oyster. Drain three dozen large, fat oysters; take a long skewer of silver or metal that is not dangerous and string it; first with a slice of bacon and then an oyster, alternating

this until it is filled, the extreme ends terminating with the bacon. Then hold the oysters over a hot clear fire and broil until the edges begin to ruffe, when they are done. In the meantime, prepare some drawn butter by placing about a tablespoonful in a cup before the fire to melt; place the oysters in a hot dish, alternating with slices of bacon; sprinkle with pepper and salt and pour over the drawn butter, mixed with about one tablespoonful of parsley, chopped fine; garnish with slices of lemon and whole olives, and serve. The oysters and bacon may be served on the skewers if they are not charred or blackened, but the other is far the daintier method.

Oysters and Bacon—Wrap three dozen oysters in a very thin slice of breakfast bacon. Lay on a broiler over a basting pan in a hot oven. Remove when the bacon is brown. Each must be fastened with a wooden toothpick. Serve with minced parsley and drawn butter, as given above, or the following Sauce Piquant.
Sauce Piquant—Chop two onions very fine. Smother in a tablespoonful of butter. When well cooked, without burning, add one tablespoonful of consommé, or water. Add two cloves of garlic, minced very fine, season to taste with hot pepper. Take two pickles about two inches in length, and cut into thin slices of about a quarter of an inch in thickness. Put this into the sauce, with a teaspoonful of strong vinegar, and let the whole boil for about five minutes. This is a very good when served with cold meats.

FALLS TO DEATH FROM SILO
Llanerch Milk Dealer's Skull Crushed He Dies in Hospital

Howard Kirk, 45 years old, of Llanerch died at the Pennsylvania Hospital late last night as the result of injuries sustained yesterday, when he fell from the top of a silo which he and other men were filling.

When the accident occurred an automobile was pressed into service and the man was rushed to the hospital at break-neck speed. It was found that his skull was fractured and an operation was performed at once in an effort to save his life.

Kirk was the owner and operator of one of the largest milk routes in the Llanerch section. He is survived by three brothers, Garrett, and John Kirk, owners of a laundry at 40th and Market streets, and William Kirk, as well as by a widow and three children.

MAY DIVORCE PERCY ARNOLD
Former Constance Berry, Who Left Husband, Comes Here to Live

Mrs. Mortimer Percy Arnold, who was Constance Berry, a New York social leader, a cousin of E. Berry Wall, has separated from her husband, according to dispatches from New York, and will come to Philadelphia to live. Rumors that she would start legal proceedings here were denied by Mrs. Arnold. It is said, but she admitted she had rented a house in the Overbrook section of the city for one year. Mrs. Arnold declined to answer questions relating to reported differences between her husband and herself and Mr. Arnold, when seen at his office, said he knew nothing of his wife's intention to live in Pennsylvania.

For more than a year, Mr. Arnold said, he and his wife had been living apart. No legal action has been started and no divorce action pending in New York State according to the friends of the couple.

The only ground on which a divorce suit might be prosecuted, it is pointed out, would be that of incompatibility of temperament or desertion, based upon their living apart. One year's residence in this city is required to start action here.

Mrs. Arnold will leave for Philadelphia on Monday, it is said.

VESSELS IN COLLISION

Quantico, Due Here Tomorrow, Struck Lightship in Harbor

Slight damage was done to the Merchant and Miners' steamship Quantico when she collided with the Boston lightship last night, according to wireless information received here today from Captain Thatcher. The vessel, which is carrying a general cargo and a number of passengers, is expected to arrive at her dock at South street wharf early tomorrow morning.

The accident occurred as the Quantico was leaving Boston harbor for this port. A hole was smashed in the side of the lightship two feet above the water line. The Quantico remained in the vicinity of the lightship until it was learned that the vessel was in no immediate danger. As a precautionary measure a naval tug and the lighthouse tender Mayflower were dispatched from Boston to the assistance of the lightship.

Heretofore the corner of Broad street and Columbia avenue has been a comparatively safe place to leave an automobile, but this morning a car was exploded last night when a thief climbed into the Ford touring car of Dr. Andrew Anders, 1785 Diamond street, and drove it slowly down the street.
