Dr. De Forest's Device Will "Listen" for Zeppelins and Give Warning of Deadly Foe's Approach

CONSCRIPTION DELAYED

NEW YORK, Oct. 16. American Ingenuity is going to allow London to sleep at night in peace. Today or tomorrow Dr. Lee de Forrest, according to his friends, will arrive in the English capital with an invention which will warn London when a Zeppelin is coming and, further than that, it will show London where the raider is.

Doctor de Forest, it is said, is going to England at the request of the British Government. He is the inventor of the audion amplifier. Several delicate microphones are placed in a geometrical figure, each equipped with an audion, so that every vibration reaching them will be magnified. The equipment will "listen" for Zeppeilns. The audiens nearest the approaching airship will register heavier than those farther, away. From the varying effect of these vibrations is calculated the line of approach. With the airship located, it is then up to the anti-

LONDON, Oct. 16. Germany's latest Zeppelin raid on London has staved off conscription, it was said in Parliamentary circles today.

The raid's result, it was explained, was to beem enlistments so much that the pro-conscription Cabinet members agreed to six weeks' delay on their program. 
