FAMED EXPERT ON BOOKS DIES AT ADVANCED AGE

John Edmands, Mercantile Librarian Emeritus, Was 95 Years Old

John Edmands, librarian emeritus of the Mercantile Library, and known for many years as the dean of book experts, died yesterday at his home, 1815 Green street. Mr. Edmands was 56 years old.

He had been ill several months.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at the Central Congregational Church, 18th and Green streets, of which Mr. Edmands was one gregational of the last two surviving members who helped organize the congregation in 1864. Mr. Edmands was identified with the Mercantile Library for fully half a century. His entrance into library work dated from 1845. He entered the Mercan-tile Library in 1856, when that institution had only 10,600 volumes. It recently had

185,000 volumes. Born in Framingham, Mass., Mr. Edmands spent his boyhood on a farm and then served a five-year apprenticeship as carpenter. When he became of age he prepared for college at Phillip's Academy, Andover, and entered Yale College, from which he was graduated in 1847. He then taught school in Rocky Mount, N. C., and later went through a three-year course in the Yale Divinity School.

Mr. Edmands was one of the original members of the American Library Asso-ciation, which was founded here in 1876,

JERSEY SUFFS EXPOSE TRICK TO FOOL LABOR

cards, paid for and issued by the antisuffragists, were being passed over the bars of saloons at Camden, thus identifying the liquor interests with the op position to the amendment. These cards, she said, had the amendment printed on them with the warning: Vote No on October 19.

For the first time in the history of New Jersey elections there will be women watchers at the polls tomorrow. Convinced that an honest election will mean victory by a 25,000 majority, the suffragists intend to take every precaution to make that victory safe. Detectives will be employed and cameras used to establish evidence where repeating suspected.

Today final plane for getting the returns as early as possible are being made. Jersey City will be the headquarters for receiving the returns, and Mrs. Lillian F. Felckert, president of the suffragists, will be in charge. All over the State the watchers have received instructions to send in their returns in half-hourly re ports, so as to avoid confusion when the polls are closed. Tonight parades will be held to wind up the campaign all over the State. Everywhere political leaders are pre-

dicting victory, and the suffragists' optimism seems justified by the encouraging statements of some of the most astute men in the State.

ANOTHER CONVERT.

Martin P. Deviin, Democratic teader and prosecutor of Mercer County, of which Trenton is the seat, is one of the most recent ones to declare in favor of suffrage. He was appointed prosecutor by President Wilson when the latter was Governor of New Jersoy, and is one of the strongest supporters of Wilson in the county. He took the stump for the suffragists a few weeks ago.

"If the same education had been given the electorate in Essex and Camden Counties," he said today, "as has been the case in Mercer County, there would not be even the slightest uncertainty as to the result. The suffragist leaders have worked bard in this county, and Mercer worked hard in this county, and agrees will go for suffrage by a large majority. The suffragists may win in Essex despite the 'machine' and 'Jim' Nugent. They may also carry Camden County regardless of machine influence and the influence of Philadelphia politicians."

An emphatic denial issued by Republian State Chairman Newton A. K. Bugbee, of Trenton, that he had declared against suffrage, was gratifying to suf-fragists. An alleged interview claimed to have been secured by Barrett L. Cran-dall, of Elizabeth, publicity manager for the "antis," put the chairman on record as saying, among other things: "I expect the Republican party to vote solidly gainst 'votes for women.' "
