MEN FLOCK TO EDDYSTONE

Remington Arms Company Starts Work on 3,000,000 Rifle Contract

Mobilization of the 20,000 workmen who will turn out the 2,000,000 rifles for the Al-Hes at the big 20-acre Remington Arms plant is now in full swing and the men are arriving at Eddystone on every train. Machinery is being received by the carload. As fast as it is installed and connected with the power system workmen are assigned to it.

Automobiles hired by the company meet every train and lodge the newly arrived workmen in boarding houses at Chester and Eddystone, listed and en-gaged four months ago. The Remington Employment Bureau is sending out hundreds of notices each day to men who have been on the payroll for that period.

A board fence, seven feet high, surunted by three rows of barbed wire surrounds the big plant. Fifty special policemen have been employed to keep out intruders. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has added another track to its four-track system through Eddy-stone to handle the increased traffic.
