

COMMONS TO QUIZ ASQUITH ON PEACE

Liberal Announces Interpellation as to Official Status of Proffers

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The question whether peace suggestions have been made from any quarter will be asked of Premier Asquith, by Anson, a Liberal member of Parliament, from Inverness, Bryce announced in the House of Commons today.

Having formally notified the House of his intention to interrogate the Premier, he was expected to put his questions at the earliest opportunity.

He seeks to know whether: Any official peace negotiations are proceeding.

Any representative of any neutral Power is making inquiries with a view to restoring peace, and whether.

The Premier's address to his Guildhall declaration that England will not cease fighting until German militarism has been crushed, Belgium has been freed and small countries' safety is guaranteed.

It was believed the Premier would give a specific answer to Bryce's queries, as it is understood the Cabinet members agree the point is one on which the country should be definitely informed.

LEWIS DAVIS LEFT \$105,000 TO PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Directed That \$20,000 Be Paid to Friends and Relatives

The will of Lewis Davis, late of 1440 North 17th street, admitted to probate today, contains substantial bequests to the Temple Presbyterian Church, Franklin and Thompson streets, and other Presbyterian institutions. Letters testamentary were granted to the Pennsylvania Company for Insurances on Lives and Granting Annuities.

The will leaves the entire estate, valued at \$105,000 and upward, to the trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America, with directions to pay bequests to a number of relatives and friends aggregating \$20,000.

The balance of the estate is to be held in trust, the interest to be paid in annuities including \$1000 annually to the Rev. William Dayton Roberts, pastor of the Temple Presbyterian Church. When the annuities terminate by death, the principal is to be divided equally between the Presbyterian Orphanage, the Presbyterian Home for Widows and Single Women and the Presbyterian Home for Aged Couples and Aged Men.

It is stipulated that the amount to be paid to any institution shall not exceed \$1000 in any one year.

All the balance of the income, the will provides, is to be paid for the benefit of the Temple Presbyterian Church as follows: \$1000 per year to the sessions of said church for its special work; \$1000 per year to the Sabbath school of said church for the expenses of conducting the school; all the balance of the income to the trustees of the church for general expenses.

Widow of the church is made on the following conditions: "That it shall remain in its present location, or, if necessary at any time to remove it, it shall not be located south of Girard avenue, nor west of Columbia avenue, east of 5th street, nor west of 10th street; that it shall retain its present name and that not more than \$2500 a year shall be paid as salary of its pastor or pastors and that not more than \$2500 shall be paid in any one year from the funds for music."

In disposing of an estate valued at \$16,000, the will of Mary A. Ray, late of 162 Pine street, devises \$5000 to the Rev. William Dayton Roberts, pastor of the Temple Presbyterian Church, to endow a room in that institution in memory of David Ray, an uncle of the testatrix. The rest of the estate goes to relatives.

Propagation of the Faith, New York, is contained in the will of Annie T. Gallagher, 194 South College avenue, who left property valued at \$9500. The rest of the estate is left to a brother, nephews and nieces.

The estate of Benjamin Finberg, 2201 North 34th street, amounting to \$105,000, is bequeathed to the widow, Annie Finberg, and a nephew, Lewis Frankel, the former being appointed executrix.

Other wills probated were those of Eliza A. Carbon, 202 North 29th street, who left property valued at \$63,800; William N. Kelley, 300 South 18th street, \$7000, and William A. Noyer, 1735 Frankford avenue, \$6000.

CARRANZA WANTS HUERTA FOR THE MURDER OF MADERO

Demand to Be Made on U. S. for Return to Mexico

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—General Huerta may face a firing squad for the killing of President Madero and Vice President Suarez in Mexico City. The new de facto Government in Mexico, headed by General Carranza, will make a demand for his extradition to Mexico within the next few days. A copy of the demand, accompanied with what officials at the Mexican Embassy here declare is conclusive evidence implicating General Huerta in the deaths of the former President and Vice President, has reached here from Mexico City.

When the new Mexican Ambassador is named this demand and the evidence will be submitted to Secretary of State Lansing. Mexican officials say the proof to be submitted is so conclusive that Huerta cannot claim immunity at the hands of the United States on the ground that any offense he may have committed was a political one.

Among the new evidence found is a complete confession from the man, who, it is alleged, actually committed the murder of Madero and Vice President Pineda. He is Major General, now held by the Guatemalan Government in the penitentiary in Guatemala City. His confession, it is said, shows that he acted under orders directly from Huerta when he killed Madero and Suarez and then formally reported that they had been shot while trying to escape from their automobiles.

HAITIAN REBELS FIRE ON AMERICAN PATROL

Soldiers Escape Injury, Although They Drive Cacos to Cover

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—A detachment of American marines under Captain Campbell, patrolling a district in the northern interior of Haiti, from Bahon to Grand Riviere, were fired upon by Caco rebels, Admiral Caperton reported to the Navy Department today. No Americans were killed or wounded. No mention was made of Haitian casualties, but it is believed here that several were killed and wounded, as the Americans followed the fire and drove the Haitians to cover.

An additional force of marines is being rushed from the battleship Connecticut to Bahon to strengthen Captain Campbell's force, Caperton reported. The trouble reported today is the first to occur in Haiti in weeks.
